Salesman Gets Jail Sentence

PRINCE GEORGE, B.C. — (AP) — Gustav Wiegner, who was found guilty of manslaughter in the Alaska highway death of a fellow townsman, this week began serving a two-year sentence.

The 24-year-old Dayton, O., salesman was charged with the murder of John McComas, 52, Aug. 10. However, Judge Norman Whittaker, convicted him Thursday night on the reduced count and sentenced him to two years in Vancouver's Okalla prison.

McComas's body was found badly mauled by animals on Highway 109 near Dawson Creek in northern British Columbia. Wiegner and the dead man's 13-year-old daughter, Louise, were detained at Kimball after Wiegner said he accidentally shot McComas while hunting squirrels.

The girl testified Wiegner subjected her to indecent treatment but he denied the charge and said at no time was he intimate with her.

Judge Whittaker made no recommendations for the future care of the young girl.

Month's Fund Total at \$1860

SPRINGFIELD — Receipts in the general fund here for September totaled \$1,860.53, bringing the total thus far in the 1948-

49 fiscal year to \$8,385.44, according to the monthly report of City Recorder K. R. Gile.

The report, which will be submitted to the city council at the October meeting Monday evening shows fines increased the fund by \$1,096 during the past month. So far that category tops fund-raising with \$4,748.10 in the fiscal year.

and in amount on the report, with \$617.37 entering the city's fund. The general fund now has \$2,653.90 from this source for his fiscal year.

Other receipts entered during September include, with the 1948-49 total following in parentheses: gasoline tax refund, \$51.39 (\$121.38); dump ground fees, \$81 (\$298.40); miscellaneous receipts, \$14.77 (\$69.11), and state liquor taxes, none for September, (\$369.55).

The \$8285.44 in the general fund puts the city slightly behind on the monthly quota to fill the \$97,550 budget for the year.

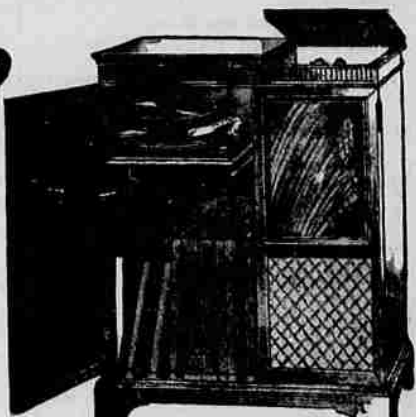

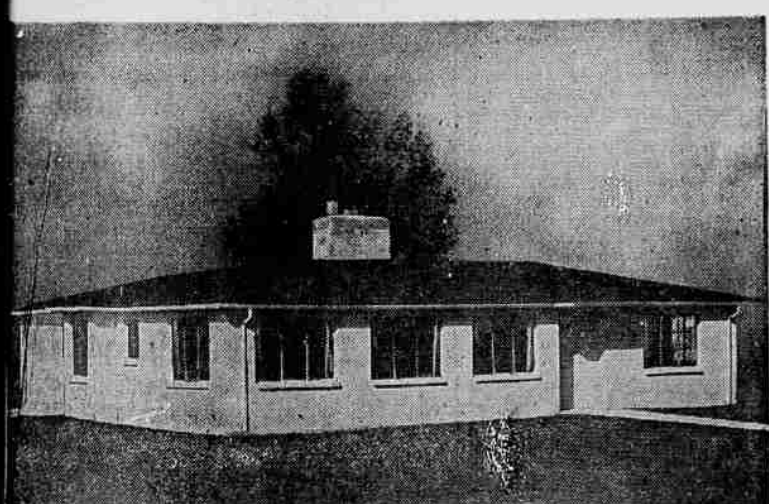
