Springfield Eyes Street Repair

SPRINGFIELD — The city council in a regular meeting here Monday night held a public hearing on the proposed improvement of Fourteenth St. from F to G Sts. by grading and graveling.

Following agreement among property owners present the council awarded the construction job to Riddle and Ellingson on a low bid of \$3546. The city engineer had estimated the job would cost \$3559.

The council also awarded a contract for the construction of a sanitary sewer in block nine of Keane's addition to the Empire Construction Co., which submitted a low bid of \$1491.40.

Program Spurred
In another important action the council elected not to participate in the state highway commission's \$250,000 special fund which had been set aside to aid cities whose streets had been heavily hit by logging and other traffic brought on by the war boom.

The city had been considering the improvement of Tenth St. from Main to K Sts., under this program with participation of about \$15,000 of state highway money. However, the council felt these funds would not stretch far enough and it would be better for the city to work on permanent street improvements under the proposed bond issue which will be voted on at the Nov. 2 general elections.

Water Supply Studied
The proposed water supply survey came up for discussion and the council heard R. H. Corey, Portland engineer, discuss engineering phases of a survey. Funds have been budgeted for this fiscal year, to determine whether the city should enter the water business as a municipal function. Mountain States Power Co. now operates the water system.
