Deerhorn-Leaburg Form New P-TA

DEERHORN — The Deerhorn Parent-Teacher Assn. met for the last time Friday evening when the members voted to disband, since the Deerhorn School has consolidated with the Leaburg School. But like the old cry, "The King is dead! Long live the King!" on the heels of the disintegration of the old P-TA, a new unit was organized that will serve the new school.

With the assistance and advice of Mrs. H. O. Colburn, county president, the officers for the new P-TA were elected and some committees were appointed. Mrs. Colburn stated the policies of the non-political, non-sectarian, non-profit organization.

Mrs. Robert Marquardt was elected president; Mrs. W. E. Mills, vice president; Mrs. Lloyd Koozer, secretary; and Mrs. Harry Moore, treasurer.

A drive for members is under way headed by Mrs. Wesley Hansen and Mrs. Merrill Morris, both of Leaburg and Mrs. Carrol Fountain and Mrs. Earl Ramsey both of Deerhorn. The two teams will compete against each other, working in any territory. Any interested person may become a member upon payment of 35 cents yearly dues. Of this amount, 25 cents goes to the state and national P-TA.

A committee to prepare the new bylaws will include Mrs. Mack Harpole, principal; Wilfred Frazee, Carrol Fountain, Mrs. Harry Tanner and Mrs. W. E. Mills. The committee will meet in the near future with the chairman, Mrs. Mills, to write the bylaws which must be approved by the local organization, and then by the state committee.

A hot lunch project was discussed. Mrs. Melvin Carter, Mrs. Feden and Mrs. Everett Wearin were appointed to investigate the possibilities of securing federal aid; or if this is impossible, to work out a plan using only locally supplied food. In any case the co-operation of the parents and the school board will be solicited.

The date of the next regular meeting will be announced.

The Deerhorn P-TA was beginning its 18th year as a school and community service club. Its membership had a total of 551 persons with the largest membership on record last year when the books showed 66 paid members. The smallest membership was 18 in 1934-5, reflecting the depression days.

The unit was organized in 1931 with the assistance of Mrs. Earl Johnson of Vaughn, who was president of the Lane County Council at that time. The first president was Mrs. "Pete" Thompson; the vice president was Mrs. E. E. Potter; and the secretary-treasurer was Leland D. Shrode.

One of the first safety projects was concerned with the near-by, deep pond which filled a gravel pit dug out by the state highway commission just across the fence, about the time the unit was organized. Slower traffic of the log trucks and other vehicles was urged by the group appealing to the state authorities. Another worthwhile interest was in promoting the Red Cross swimming lessons in summer.

Among the many health projects, some large and some small, were the annual summer round-up; securing lectures, pictures and other aids from the county health department; T-B tests for children and adults; interest in the Children's Farm Home; the Alice Marie Home; the Spriners Hospital, and the "Iron Lung" fund.
