Recipe

Hot Egg and Cheese Sandwich
6 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoon cider vinegar
1/2 cup mayonnaise
2 tbsps minced green pepper
1/4 teaspoon sugar
Thin crisp toast
2 cups hot cheese sauce
Remove yolks from eggs, mash, and mix with mustard, salt, vin- egar and mayonnaise. Chop egg whites and fold into the yolk mixture along with the green pepper and sugar.
