FLORENCE — Robert F. Ball, secretary-manager of the Baker County Chamber of Commerce and representing a group of civic organizations of eastern Oregon, was guest speaker when Western Lane County Chamber of Commerce met Monday evening at the Legion Hall.

"Oregon's Power Crisis" was the subject which the speaker presented, outlining the dramatic story of Oregon's rapid growth and its opportunity for future development.

He urged the passage of Referendum "306X Yes" at the general election which would change existing Oregon hydro-electric laws, and permit development of public utilities by private enterprise.

The chamber voted in favor of amending the by-laws changing the manner of electing the board of directors, none of which is now existent. Members will be appointed by President A. E. Nelson and announced at the next meeting night.

The nominating committee will also report at the Nov. 7 meeting, which will be held at the Legion hall, with the offices of president, first and second vice presidents to be filled for the 1949 term.

The holiday season will be enhanced by another "Yuletide Basketball Jamboree," due to action taken at the meeting when three basketball teams will be invited to vie with Siuslaw for honors during the Christmas vacation period. Harold Parsons, Ed Kimble and Glenn Long will again be in charge of this activity.

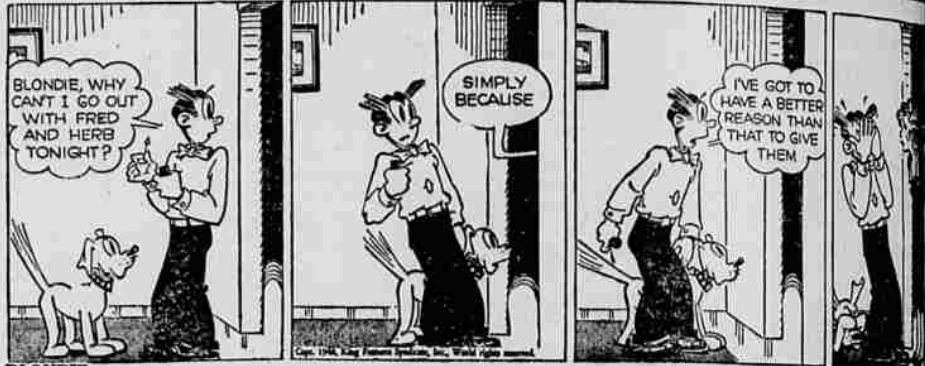
