

Safety Council Decides Course

Members of the Eugene Safety Council met Monday night at the Eugene Hotel and decided to undertake a project of explaining to the city's service clubs the proposed system of one-way streets in downtown Eugene.

In their first fall meeting, members of the council also agreed to hold semi-monthly meetings this winter to facilitate performance

of a program of traffic, home and industrial safety promotion.

Blair Alderman, president of the council composed of representatives from most Eugene civic and service organizations, was informed by City Manager Deane Seeger that the city council will be asked to refer safety problems to the safety planners. Exploration of such problems by the safety council would be of great benefit to the city administration, Seeger added.

Other actions taken at the Monday meeting included a decision that the safety council will issue monthly news letters to the various civic organizations to add greater effectiveness to its work.

Mill Worker Files Court Suit

PORTLAND —(AP)—A lumber mill worker who wants to go back to work has filed a citizen's suit asking the federal court here to order West Coast shipping to resume.

Arnold L. Couty, Coos Bay, charged both the Waterfront Employers Assn. and the CIO longshoremen unjustly obstructed loading and unloading of ships by the strike.

No Help

Couty said he was one of 1500 Coos Bay citizens thrown out of work as a result of the maritime dispute. He said he was filing the suit without legal assistance, but explained he would welcome the intervention of any neutral group as a participant in his complaint.

"I'm not filing this suit against individuals or officers, but against the organizations. I'm doing it in the interests of all the people of the Pacific Coast," he said.

Bill of Rights

Couty explained he filed under articles one, nine and ten of the Bill of Rights Amendment to the Constitution. He did not elaborate on what his arguments will be if the court hears the case.

The Bill of Rights articles cited provide for redress of grievances, right of the people to exercise authority not delegated to the government and exercise of power reserved to the people.

Oregon Shows Fast Increase In Population

PORTLAND —(AP)—The Bureau of Census has officially acknowledged that Oregon is the fastest growing state in the nation.

Oregon was listed No. 1 in increase of adult population — up 361,000 since 1940 to a total of 1,109,000, a growth of 48.3 per cent. Washington was second with a 40.1 per cent increase.

Oregon was second in increase of those under 21 years. The total now is 516,000 up 175,000 from 1940 — an increase of 51.2 per cent. California was ahead with 59.7 per cent increase.

UO's Future Chamber Topic

"What's Ahead for the University of Oregon?" will be the topic of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce's Friday forum luncheon this week at the Eugene Hotel.

Taking note of the university's homecoming festivities this weekend, Chamber President Orlando John Hollis has announced that the noon meeting will deal with plans for expansion of the school.

University President H. K. Newburn will explain how building plans and their integration provide a physical plant adequate for the constantly increasing university enrollment. He also will discuss the educational problems that are being encountered in the development of a larger university.

R. E. Kiensorg, chairman of the state board of higher education's building committee, will be another speaker at the forum luncheon. Hollis has reported, and other members of the board have been invited to address the Chamber and its guests.

TORONTO —(AP)—The Very Rev. Hewlett Johnson, Dean of Canterbury, will arrive in Ottawa Nov. 2 for a series of speaking engagements in Canada and the United States. It was announced this week. The announcement was made by Dr. J. G. Endicott, member of provisional committee of the newly-formed Toronto Peace Council which is sponsoring the dean's talks in Canada.

The "Red Dean" will speak in public meetings at Toronto Nov. 7, at Ottawa Nov. 8 and in Winnipeg Nov. 24.

In the two weeks between Ottawa and Winnipeg speeches a series of speaking engagements is scheduled in the United States.

Dr. Johnson, who was refused a U. S. visa to make a speaking tour sponsored by the American-Soviet Council of Friendship, has been granted a visa for his coming visit.

City Police Investigate Two Local Burglaries

Civil Service Exams Opened

Examinations for Student Dietitian, cameraman and platemaker were announced Tuesday by the U. S. Civil Service Commission. No written test is required. Student dietitian positions pay \$1470 a year. Courses lasting 12 months will be given by the Veterans Administration at hospitals in Los Angeles, Cal.; the Bronx, New York City; Hines, Ill.; and Memphis, Tenn.

To qualify for the position, competitors must have received a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university, and their courses must have included chemistry, biology, foods, institutional management, nutrition and diet in disease, social sciences, and education. Age limits, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 35 years.

Cameraman and platemaker positions will be in Washington, D. C., and vicinity, and will pay \$2284 and \$2498 a year. Positions requiring both kinds of work pay from \$2498 to \$2974 a year. To qualify for this examination applicants must have had from six to three years of experience in the operation of copying cameras in making offset plates, or with the equipment and processes used in the preparation and completion of plates for offset duplication purposes.

Appropriate residence study in camera operation or platemaking may be substituted for part of the experience. Age limits for these jobs, waived for veteran preference, are from 18 to 62 years. Information and application forms for these positions may be obtained from the Eugene Civil Service Examiner's secretary at the Postoffice Bldg.

the Housing and Rent Act of 1948, explains under what conditions a tenant may be evicted by his landlord.

Evictions can be made for the following reasons:

If the landlord of a member of his immediate family wishes to occupy the building.
If the landlord wishes to alter or remodel the structure for the immediate purpose of conversion into additional housing accommodations, or if the landlord wishes to demolish the structure.

If the landlord decides to withdraw the structure from the rental market and thereafter not to offer it for rent.

If the landlord has contracted to sell the place to a purchaser for the purchaser's immediate occupancy.

If the landlord is exempt from taxation under Section 101 (5) of the Internal Revenue Code (non-profit, religious, charitable and educational institutions) and wishes the premises for the purpose of housing staff members.

Under the 1948 Housing and Rent Act, the tenant still possesses the right to sue for up to three times the amount of landlord overcharges, plus court costs and attorney fees.

Figures from the Eugene Rent Control office show that more than \$1700 was paid back to Lane County tenants through that office during the first half of 1948. 1500 dwellings are registered with Eugene Rent Control headquarters. In Portland, with 100,000 dwellings registered for rental purposes, \$12,000 was returned to tenants through June of this year.

Rent control officials in Eugene said these figures showed that local landlords, judging on a percentage basis, were "showing more faith" in complying with the law than were landlords in Portland.
