This report was given to the trustees at the meeting Tuesday evening. It was also told that while there are at present eight children in the home, there are many others desiring admission, and there is room for fifteen children. The home needs very much to have some civic minded organization sponsor it, and held to obtain a state license.

A new member was elected to the board of trustees, Gordon Olson. He also was chosen chairman of the board. He has long been interested in the home.

Thanks were given to Wally's Grocery for the baskets of fresh vegetables sent to the home each Saturday evening.

Miss Myrtle Borbee's report, as superintendent of the home, showed expenditures of \$1294.81 for the five months, \$686 of which was salaries and \$628.73 for food.

Recipe

HONEY FRUIT CAKE
It is time now to make the Christmas fruit cake and put it away to "ripen." Honey Fruit Cake has just the right combination of dried and candied fruit, nuts, and honey to make it rich, moist, and delicious. For a festive decoration use blanched almonds, candied cherries, and citron.

Honey Fruit Cake
1 cup prunes
1 cup dried apricots
1 cup golden raisins
2 cups seedless raisins
1 cup blanched almonds
1 cup walnut meats
1 1/2 cup finely cut citron
1 cup finely cut candied pineapple
1/2 cup thinly sliced candied cherries
1 cup finely cut candied orange peel
1 cup finely cut candied lemon peel
1 cup shredded coconut
2 1/2 cups sifted all purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons cinnamon
2 teaspoons allspice
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cup honey
6 eggs
Rinse dried fruits and dry thoroughly. Cut prunes from pits into small pieces. Slice apricots fine. Chop almonds and walnuts. Combine dried fruits, nuts, candied fruits and peels, and coconut with 1 cup flour. Sift together remaining flour, baking powder, salt and spice. Cream shortening thoroughly. Blend in honey gradually, and beat well. Beat eggs thoroughly and add slowly to creamed mixture, blending well. Beat in sifted dry ingredients. Pour batter over floured fruit mixture. Mix thoroughly. Pour into 10-inch tube pan which has been lined with 2 thicknesses of brown paper and 1 of waxed paper. Bake in slow oven (250°F.) 4 to 4 1/2 hours with shallow pan of water in bottom of oven during baking. Remove from pan to cool. Allow to ripen 2 to 4 weeks before cutting. Makes about a 7 pound cake.

National President Of Rose Society Talks at Corvallis

Members of several Oregon Rose Societies paid closest attention to George Sweetser, president of the American Rose Society for the past five years, as he talked at Corvallis, Wednesday evening, on "Mistakes in Growing Roses." Mr. Sweetser first paid tribute to western roses, saying humorously that he understood growers in the West got their roses and their winter supply of wood from the same bushes.

Mr. Sweetser who is young in appearance and manner, admits that he is eighty years of age. He went on to speak in competent manner of the composition of the soil, laying special emphasis on organic matter, which he says breaks down to provide nitrogen, the growth factor, phosphorus for root growth, and potash, the three major elements which help the vigor and health of the plant. He urged plenty of water for the soil and care in pruning, saying that food is stored in vigorous new wood, and too much of it removed in pruning means a loss for the plant.

He closed in poetic vein, giving a quotation from a speech made to a graduating class during the late war, "In whatever brave new world may emerge from this chaos . . . homes will still be built and roses, stars and surging seas will still delight the senses."
