Salary Increases Urged for Pastors

PHILADELPHIA — (U.P.) — The
general assembly of the Presby-
terian Church in the U.S.A. re-
vealed today that Presbyteries
throughout the nation have been
advised to give their pastors cost-
of-living salary increases.

The move resulted from an
overture passed by the assembly
at its Seattle meeting last May,
in which it was urged that sal-
aries be boosted to keep the
pastors "free from worldly cares
and avocations."

Each Presbytery has been in-
structed to establish a committee
of laymen to consider proper ad-
justments of pastors' salaries.
Church officials pointed out that
the average salary of ministers is
\$3,635.
