Mayor Earl McNutt explained that Goodridge was named by him to fill the unexpired term of Ed Mack who, in becoming a state plumbing inspector, has been obliged to resign.

The council also honored requests that Sergeant S. J. Hanns be retained as a member of the city police beyond the retirement age established under the public employees act. Similar action was taken on requests concerning continued employment of Will Wynn, library employee, and Miss Elma Hendricks, city librarian.

The council spent a considerable portion of this week's meeting deliberating on the case of Mrs. Hele Armitage who is endeavoring to sell a portion of her corner lot at 7th and Kincaid.

Blocked by a board of appeals ruling that the area she intends to sell would be below requirements of the city land-use ordinance, Mrs. Armitage told the council that she purchased the corner property with the specific intention of later selling the back 67 feet of the lot as a small home site.

The council was told that plans have been drawn for a home located on this part of the original lot and that it would meet all setback requirements if it were built. Only in total area would the new lot be at variance with the city ordinance. The new house would be adjacent to an alley and would face on 27th Ave.

Alliance Pact May Be Drawn

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Invitations to a portentous conference to draft a military alliance between North America and western Europe probably will go out soon after next week's presidential election.

Nations expected to take part in the initial phases are the United States, Canada and Europe's western union powers—Britain, France, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg.

Several other countries in the non-Communist lineup—namely Italy, Iceland, Norway and Denmark—may join in the talks at some point.

Officials here say it is not yet clear whether the invitations will be issued formally by the five-nation western European union or by the United States. Nor has a city for the conference been chosen, although all preliminary work on the pact has been done in Washington.

PHILADELPHIA — (AP)—Sen. Alben W. Barkley, Democratic vice presidential candidate, says the Republican Party is "ashamed" of some of its ex-presidents and wants "the people to forget them."

Speaking without a prepared text at the 14th annual \$100-a-plate dinner Monday night, the Kentuckian offered \$1000 to anyone "who can show me any Republican who has praised the Harding, Coolidge or Hoover administrations in this campaign."

Barkley, who spoke over a local radio network (WFIL-ABC), predicted that "when Jan. 3 comes, we will have a Democratic Senate and House and on Jan. 30 Harry S. Truman will be re-inaugurated president—and the new vice-president won't hurt anything."

PORTLAND, Ore.—U.S.—Democrat Lew Wallace and Republican Douglas McKay were making their ninth-inning bid Tuesday for Portland voters as they raced for the Oregon governor's chair.

Both addressed the Chamber of Commerce Monday in an opening try for one-third of the state's 680,000 voters.

Wallace said he favored lower income taxes and opposed a sales tax. McKay said a good business was the responsibility of business men.

ITHACA, N. Y.—(AP)—Norman Thomas, Socialist Party candidate for president, labeled as hypocrites Monday night the statements of Democratic and Republican parties that they believe in free enterprise.

At the same time, Thomas told an overflow audience at Cornell University that the Communist influence in the Progressive Party is daily becoming more manifest.

He declared there was no hope for the younger generation or for labor in rallying around "these tattered banners," adding that a Socialist vote would be a protest against both the reactionary right and the reactionary left.

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif.—(AP)—GOP vice-presidential nominee Earl Warren brought his aerial hedge-hopping campaign into Southern California Tuesday for a two day stand.

Keying his bid to nail down California's 25 electoral votes to a chatty informal type of campaigning, Warren began another busy day with a rally at San Bernardino's civic auditorium.

He began a week's tour of California Monday with a plane and auto swing through the Santa Clara and Salinas Valleys, making open air talks in San Jose, Santa Cruz and Watsonville and a night speech before a near capacity audience in Salinas High School.

Two Rulings Set for Court

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Two rulings by the National Labor Relations Board, disputed by the CIO, appear to be headed for a fight in court.

They (1) make mass picketing illegal when it blocks plant entrances and (2) hold a parent union responsible for illegal actions by its agents, even when the union opposed the actions.

CIO general counsel Arthur Goldberg said Monday the longshoremen's union is expected to ask the NLRB for a re-hearing of the case which grew out of a 1947 strike in California. If the board turns down that request, the CIO

will take the case to the circuit court of appeals and, if necessary, to the Supreme Court, Goldberg said.

He added that the board's action, taken under the Taft-Hartley Act, "should bring home to the American people the imperative need" for the act's repeal.

TO THE VOTERS OF EUGENE:

THE BYERS' STORY

When the Eugene Planning Commission and the common council of the City of Eugene was considering the passage of Ordinance No. 9125, classifying the Henry Byers property on East Franklin Boulevard from residential use to business use, one of the very vital problems discussed was that of "SPOT-ZONING."

THE EUGENE PLANNING COMMISSION FAVORED THE CLASSIFICATION TO BUSINESS USE AS DID A MAJORITY OF THE COUNCIL, AND IN SO DOING DECIDED THAT THE CLASSIFICATION OF THE PROPERTY TO BUSINESS DID NOT CONSTITUTE SPOT-ZONING.

Those in opposition to Ordinance No. 9125 contend that the reclassification constitutes spot-zoning. THIS IS NOT THE CASE. They base their opinion upon a decision of the Oregon Supreme Court (Page vs. City of Portland, decided May, 1946), in which property zoned to business was reverted to residential use, that CASE HAS NO BEARING AND IS NOT AUTHORITY FOR THE POSITION OF THE OPPOSITION TO ORDINANCE 9125.

In the Page case, the circumstances are entirely different from those in the Byers case, inasmuch as the property re-zoned, aside from non-conforming users, had no business houses within a quarter of a mile within the property. The Court in its decision placed the property back in a residential classification because the property in question was in the "heart of an exclusive residential district in its prime."

THE FRANKLIN BOULEVARD AREA IS NOT A RESIDENTIAL AREA, BUT IS ONE DESTINED FOR BUSINESS. The opposition admits that this should be business property. The Oregon Supreme Court has further stated, "Whether there has been a substantial change of conditions in a use district as to warrant the enactment of an amendatory zoning ordinance IS PRIMARILY A QUESTION FOR THE COUNSEL TO DETERMINE ITS ACTION, IN REFERENCE THERETO, WILL NOT BE REVIEWED BY THE COURTS IF THE QUESTION IS FAIRLY DEBATABLE." The question before the voters has been discussed and considered by the Planning Commission and the common council of Eugene for almost three years. Many opinion debates have been held and the council fully advised of all the problems connected thereto.

In fairness to yourself, drive out Franklin Boulevard and observe the businesses on the north side and also the businesses on the south side and the business and industrial construction. You will be convinced that the Henry Byers property is VIRTUALLY THE ONLY PROPERTY WHICH DOES NOT HAVE EITHER A GOING BUSINESS OR ONE IN THE PROCESS OF CONSTRUCTION. The question in this case is not one of spot-zoning, but one of fairness and of justice, and it would be unfair and unjust not to uphold the common council and Ordinance No. 9125.
