GOP Presidential Win Certain; But Congress Score Gloomy

NEW YORK — (AP) — Confident Republicans are laying in red fire Wednesday for their first presidential victory celebration in 20 years but the party's congressional prospects are spotted by gloomy doubts.

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey is ahead Wednesday in his contest with President Truman for the White House. Polls and the experts agree on that. The last time the Republicans won a presidential election was in 1928 when Herbert C. Hoover licked the late Alfred E. Smith. The last time one of the polls—and some of the experts—were wrong on the White House was in 1936 when they predicted Alf M. Landon of Kansas would defeat FDR for the second New Deal term.

Chamber to Hear Of State Issues

Brief objective analysis of all the "state issues" on the November 2 ballot will be presented at Friday's Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon by Dr. James H. Gilbert.

Formerly dean of the college of liberal arts at the University of Oregon and an ex-adviser to the state tax commission, Dr. Gilbert will explain the purpose and implications of the various measures on which all of Oregon's voters will vote next Tuesday.

Chamber President Orlando John Hollis, in announcing Dr. Gilbert's acceptance of the speaking engagement, reported that the purpose of this Friday's noon forum will be to give Chamber members and their guests authoritative information with which they may be better able to judge the ballot propositions.

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Rotary Hears Naval Officer

The observance of Navy Day Oct. 27 was noted at Rotary Club Tuesday noon with a talk by Capt. Clyde Jensen, head of the Naval ROTC unit at Oregon State College, who told Rotarians that Navy Week is designed to acquaint civilians with the functions and structure of the Navy.

Need in peacetime is for a good, small, compact Navy that is able to expand quickly in case of emergency, Captain Jensen explained. The Naval Reserve system answers the need for qualified officers and men available for immediate duty in case of the emergency, he believes.

The postwar Naval Reserve, which started in August, 1945, has 223,000 officers and men, and 950,000 volunteers, Captain Jensen explained. There are 764 divisions in 300 cities, each with about 200 men and 15 to 19 officers. One division is situated in Eugene, six in Portland, and others over Oregon.

By the end of the fiscal year in 1949 the reserve ranks will be full, Captain Jensen said. Most of the members are veterans and young men, and veterans are particularly valuable because of their experience. New officers are taken from the 52 NROTC units over the nation, and vacancies in the organized reserve are filled from the ranks of the volunteer reserve.

The Naval Reserve program has been closely integrated with the regular Navy program, Captain Jensen pointed out. Each bureau and department of the navy has a special section which handles Naval Reserve business.
