Suit Filed For \$100,000

A suit alleging \$100,000 in general damages was on file in circuit court Wednesday on behalf of Frederick P. Browning vs. V. A. Smith and others.

The plaintiff alleges the defendants including the Consolidated Lumber Co., Fern Ridge Lumber Co., Southern Pacific Co., Pacific Electric Railway Co., and their supposed agents and employees, were negligent in loading a flat car with lumber at Veneta.

The plaintiff states in the complaint that the flat car was transported from Veneta to the consignee, the Golden Gate Lumber Co. in Santa Monica, Calif., where part of the allegedly improperly loaded lumber fell on the plaintiff causing permanent injuries on Oct. 28, 1947. The plaintiff claims injuries including a compression fracture of two vertebrae, fracture at base of left heel, fracture in left foot, concussion of the brain and other injuries. Browning in his complaint declares that the injuries were of such an extent that it will prevent him from being engaged in gainful employment.

Special damages of an unspecified amount are asked for loss of earnings and medical expenses. Browning is being represented by Eben and Jones, Portland attorneys.

Jaycees Plug Safe Driving

Plans for an intensified safety driving campaign in Eugene were discussed at the semi-monthly meeting of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, Thursday noon.

W. J. Robert, chairman of the Junior Chamber safety committee, said there was a growing need for safety measures to cut down traffic accidents. As a part of the committee's program, he said Cliff Bergere, nationally known racing driver, would present sound movies of past Indianapolis Speed Derbies in the Eugene High School auditorium, Nov. 4, at 8 p.m.

Chief of Police Keith Jones will speak briefly on the traffic situation in Eugene, explaining the chief causes for car accidents. Bergere will also speak at the safety show, giving highlights of his racing experiences. He has driven 6520 miles alone on the 500-mile Indianapolis Speedway and has smashed up nearly 400 cars in his driving career.

Junior Chamber officials say the safety show will be free of charge.

Traffic Tolls Still Too High

CHICAGO —(AP)—The nation clung to only a small cut in traffic deaths from last year as it began the last and most dangerous quarter of 1948 in terms of driving hazards.

This was reported Friday by the National Safety Council which found September's death toll up four per cent for the month. It was only the second month this year to show an increase.

The September, 1948, toll was 3040 or 120 greater than that of September, 1947. This brought the nine-month count to 22,430, only three per cent fewer deaths than the 23,010 in the same 1947 period.

Klamath Falls, Ore., with no fatalities was tied with Holland, Mich., and Birmingham, Mich., for the best traffic record of the last nine months among cities in the 10,000-25,000 population class.

Bike Rider Injured

Edison Davis, age 10, 570 Seventeenth Ave. E., was slightly injured Thursday afternoon when his bicycle collided with an automobile as he rode out of an alley into Eleventh Ave. The accident occurred between Olive and Charnelton at 3:52 p.m.

A city police officer called to the scene reported that young Davis had suffered knee abrasions and that his bicycle was slightly damaged. The driver of the car was not held.

BUTTERFAT TAX MULLED

The butterfat tax collected by the city of Eugene for support of its milk inspection program was discussed Thursday noon at a meeting of the City Health Commission. Representatives of the milk distributors, who are paying the tax under protest, met with the commission. No conclusive action was taken at this meeting, but the commission indicated that the subject will be studied again after additional information is obtained.

All over Oregon open-minded people are asking: Why Require Purchase of a Bottle? LEGALIZE LIQUOR BY THE GLASS!

In a scientific, state-wide survey recently completed, a reliable public-opinion research organization, which has accurately forecast the results of many Oregon elections, finds that "a majority of those who have heard of the measure (liquor-by-the-glass) would presently vote for its passage!"

This confirms a similar state-wide survey, made last spring, which found 46% of Oregon's citizens in favor of liquor-by-the-glass and 44% insisting on purchase of liquor by-the-bottle only.

It is a fact that whenever open-minded citizens or organizations have studied the measure without prior prejudice, they have found reasons for supporting this measure and no legitimate reasons for opposing it.

The Retail Trade Bureau of the Portland Chamber of Commerce says, in an authorized statement: "This Bureau is on record, through its membership, favoring amendment to the Knox Law which would permit the sale of drinks in hotels and clubs, over the bar. The reason for our taking this action is the belief that it would encourage temperance and would not necessitate individuals buying a whole bottle and consuming it immediately, if an individual drink could be purchased."

The Oregon State Federation of Labor is on record with the following resolution: "Whereas, the present system of liquor control in Oregon is not good and results in imposition of unreasonable regulations upon citizens who desire to consume alcoholic beverages, and, whereas, the sale of alcoholic beverages in hotels and restaurants and other public places should be lawful without the possession of club licenses; therefore it is resolved that the Oregon State Federation of Labor will join with any other responsible groups who initiate the change of the present law to permit the free and open sale of beverages of alcoholic content by responsible licensed businesses without the present cumbersome restrictions."

On February 21, 1948, Oregon's largest newspaper, The Oregonian, said editorially: "The privilege of buying

liquor by-the-drink would be appreciated by tourists, many of whom complain of the present system. It would encourage hotels, restaurants and entertainment clubs to improve their facilities. But without considering these benefits to business, one also may hope for a decline in drunkenness in public places and rapid diminishment of bootlegging if there is licensing and strict control of legitimate outlets for sale of liquor by-the-drink."

Seth F. Harper, superintendent of the State Liquor Dispensary in our neighboring state of Idaho, in a letter dated August 26, 1948, said: "I am certain that with the high license and bond, careful state regulations regarding the sale of liquor, and a good enforcement operation, sale of liquor by-the-drink can be a decided factor in a temperate regulation of the use of alcoholic beverages."

EVEN ITS FRIENDS WILL ADMIT THE KNOX LAW IS FAR FROM PERFECT!

C. C. Chapman, of The Oregon Voter, has been critical of this measure for reasons of his own, but in the issue of August 7, 1948, he has this to say: "Oregon's Knox Law seemed the best way to compromise between prohibition and the saloon. It has worked out fairly well. Under it there have been no centers for drinking of hard liquor except the home, the licensed club or the licensed establishment to which the purchaser could take his own bottle and have service of his own liquor. Conditions have not been satisfactory to anyone, but they have approached a moderate acceptability."

In a recent published statement, Mrs. Ruth E. Toore, state president of the W.C.T.U., typical of the organizations working against the liquor-by-the-glass measure, said "Let me emphasize again that the Oregon Women's Christian Temperance Union is now, as in the past, opposed to all liquor sales, whether they are sales by-the-glass, or sales by-the-bottle through the state liquor control system operating under the Knox law or any other law."
