

Air Force Gets Final Allotment

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Air Force announced Thursday final allotment of \$154,817,000 to buy new planes and to alter some of those already on order.

The funds come out of the \$1,528,612,000 fund for aircraft procurement provided for the current fiscal year.

Approximately \$75,000,000 will be used in the modification of planes now in production. The changes will include safety changes, winterization, better electronics devices and other improvements.

President Truman approved the work on Tuesday, the Air Force said.

Wednesday Mr. Truman certified a recommendation by Defense Secretary Forrester for the \$79,817,000 for new planes.

Woman Hits Milk Control

SEATTLE—(AP)—"I'd rather see milk a public utility in Washington than have consumers saddled with a milk control act like Oregon's," Mrs. Frederick Fritz of Portland, Secretary-Treasurer of the Affiliated Milk Committees of Oregon, told the Seattle chapter of the League of Women Voters Thursday.

She said her group is attempting to repeal Oregon's control laws and spoke about legislation which she asserted has been proposed by an industry committee headed by August Kristoferson of Seattle.

Kristoferson said the dairy industry is merely studying milk control and no definite action has been planned. He described usual milk-control legislation as involving the fixing of prices to producers and consumers.
