Vida Voters Urged 328 Yes

VIDA — The McKenzie River Protective and Development Assn. recommends that voters pass the bill for providing garbage disposal, by marking their ballots 328 Yes. The association has been working for several years to obtain garbage sites. There is one site in use now between Blue River and McKenzie Bridge, and land has been obtained for a garbage pit near Vida but it cannot be developed for use without assistance from the county, as the association has not sufficient funds to build the road.

This bill will provide for garbage collection places at Blue River, Vida, Leaburg, and Waterville.

It is extremely important, local people think, for both local people and all the friends from Lane County who enjoy driving up the McKenzie to vote for this improvement, from which other scenic areas in the county would benefit also.

People of the Vida district will vote at the Vida Hall, for what is called Gate Creek precinct.

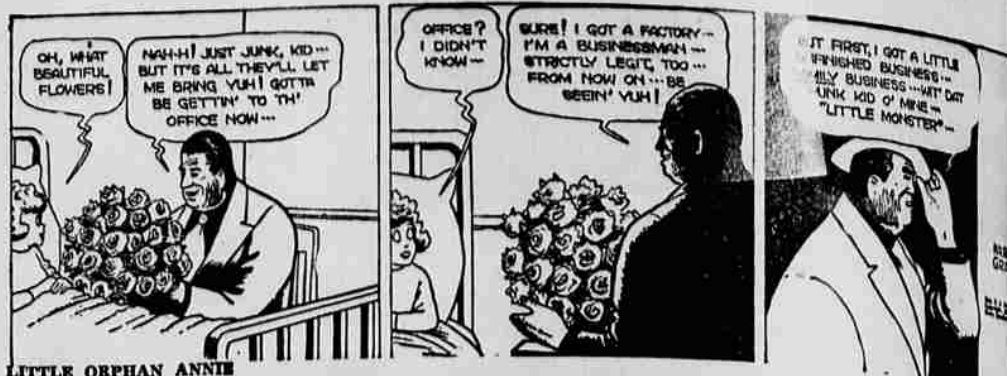
