Water Supply Forecast Good

BOISE, Idaho — (AP) — Western water supplies in 1949 will be normal or better than normal, forecasters with the Soil Conservation Service at Medford, Ore., predicted in the November issue of the Bureau of Reclamation monthly magazine, the Reclamation Era.

The forecasters said that while there may be some bad spots, a survey of 147 reservoirs widely scattered through the western states show October storage at about 106 per cent of the 10-year average.

Carry-Overs
 Paul A. Ewing, senior irrigation economist at Medford, and R. A. Work, senior irrigation engineer, summarized the Oct. 1 status of the carry-over for Washington and Oregon in this way:

Washington — A better than average carry-over in eight major reservoirs with a combined capacity of 2,106,000 acre-feet. Storage on Oct. 1 totaled 1,465,590 acre-feet, or 69 per cent of capacity. The 10-year average is 1,231,070 acre-feet, or 58 per cent.

Oregon — Twenty-one Oregon reservoirs show October storage at 37 per cent of capacity, compared with a 10-year average of 42 per cent. Total capacity of the reservoirs is 2,619,000 acre-feet.

Pain of Childbirth Lessened Without Drugs, Study Reports

NEW HAVEN — (AP) — Most women could have their babies with little or no anesthetic, and still not have unbearable pain, a study here finds.

The secret lies in a training program in which banishing fear is a major point. Fear causes tension, and tension "is the chief cause of pain in normal labor."

Clinical Report

The report is made by Dr. Frederick W. Goodrich and Dr. Herbert Thoms of Yale University medical school in the November issue of the American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Their work is a clinical study of the ideas and methods of natural childbirth, recommended mainly by a British physician, Dr. Grantly Dick Read. The Yale study started in January, 1946 and reports on 156 deliveries.

Needed No Help

Slightly more than half of these 156 women did not need any anesthetic help, they said. Another 25 per cent wanted or needed only a single dose of some drug during childbirth. Others needed more and about 17 per cent needed the

usual amount of anesthesia.

When asked if they wanted their next babies delivered the same way, nearly 85 per cent of the women said "yes," with no qualifications, Dr. Goodrich and Dr. Thoms said. This included 10 women who had taken the usual amount of drugs. Only nine patients said "no," and all were women who had taken the usual amount of anesthesia.

Driver Is Acquitted of Drunkenness Charge

SPRINGFIELD — A six-man jury Friday in municipal court acquitted Henry Orval Tilford, 49, of 725 N.W. 17th St., Portland, Ore., of a charge of drunken driving.

Tilford pleaded not guilty when he appeared before City Judge R. B. Carmichael Oct. 11 and trial was set for Oct. 29. The charge included drunken driving and being involved in an accident at 5th and A streets. Bail of \$200 was posted and refunded, minus the jury fee.

Worthless West Coast Tree Has Possibilities

ST. HELENS — (AP) — Monterey Pine, a native West coast tree which has always been considered almost useless for lumber, may prove valuable after all.

Glen Hawkins, head of the Columbia County tree farm, said experimental plantings of the tree will be tried. They will follow a system used in New Zealand, where Monterey Pines, carefully spaced in plantings, grew rapidly and straight. Ordinarily, the tree

develops a trunk too twisted for sawmill cutting.

The tree farm here will use seeds from the New Zealand experiment.

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Why require purchase of a bottle? Legalize liquor-by-the-glass!

VOTE THE WAY YOU WANT . . . BUT KNOW THE FACTS BEFORE YOU VOTE!

In an editorial last spring recommending a change in the Knox Law to legalize liquor-by-the-glass, Oregon's largest newspaper, *The Oregonian*, said: "Proposed amendments to laws regulating the sale of intoxicating liquor seldom receive impartial treatment by voters and legislators. Politicians and pressure groups usually move in quickly to confuse the issues."

ARE YOU REALLY FOR TEMPERANCE?
 In two recent state-wide studies of public opinion, a reliable research organization which has successfully predicted the results of many Oregon elections, found that there is a prohibitionist element in the state approximating only seven per cent of the population.

Like all minority groups, the "prohis" make a noise all out of proportion to their size. Bear in mind this group is working indefatigably to abolish liquor in any form. The state president of the WCTU said recently, in a published statement, the WCTU "is now, as in the past, opposed to all liquor sales, whether they are sales by-the-glass, or sales by-the-bottle, through the state liquor control system operating under the KNOX law or any other law."

If the "prohis" succeed in hoodwinking the people of the state into rejecting the liquor-by-the-glass amendment, the next object of their renewed attack will be wines and beer.

At its recent national convention, held in Portland, the WCTU stated that it considered liquor intoxicating in any form with an alcoholic content of more than .5%!

\$250,000.00 PER YEAR ADDED TO PUBLIC WELFARE FUND!
 The pensions our older citizens of Oregon are receiving are pitifully small measured against today's cost of living. The *Oregon Journal* stated in an editorial recently that the state public welfare fund would receive an estimated additional \$250,000.00 per year from license fees and bottle taxes paid by establishments licensed to serve liquor-by-the-glass. All bottle sales would be confined to state liquor stores as at present.

PUBLIC BENEFITS WILL BE MANY!
 Impartial studies prove, that if anything, liquor consumption decreases when the public is given the choice of liquor-by-the-bottle or by-the-glass.

Responsible organizations such as the Oregon State Federation of Labor, the Retail Trade Bureau of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and many others have advocated liquor-by-the-glass in the belief that it will encourage temperance, minimize bootlegging, discourage drinking from bottles in cars.

James Mount, president of the Oregon Advertising Club, has pointed out the benefits the entire state will receive from increased tourist trade through better facilities made possible through liquor-by-the-glass. Can Oregon afford to pass up this opportunity for increased income and additional jobs? It's now or never. Defeat the prohis . . .
