A new all-time record was established in building permits issued by the Eugene building inspector's office in October. However, over 90 per cent of the total building values represented in the month's permit total was covered in a single permit.

A \$1,700,000 permit issued to the University of Oregon for construction of the Erb Memorial

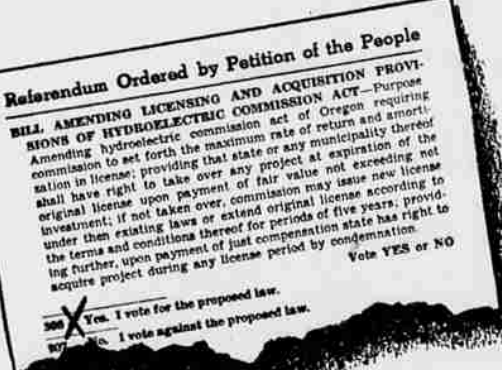
