Gold Pile Grows Bigger

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government's mounting gold pile appeared on the verge of topping the \$24,000,000 mark this week after rising above \$1,700,000,000 the last 12 months.

The most recent report, for Tuesday, showed \$23,996,169,474.59.

Never before has any nation ever had so much gold. The U. S. hoard represents over three fifths of the world's known supply.

The Russians are believed to have the second biggest store, yet their holdings are estimated at only one-tenth those of the United States.

Mining in this country accounts for only a small part of the increasing gold stock.

Most of the gain results from foreign countries' digging into their dwindling gold supplies to pay for purchases here not offset by sales or American aid funds.

Surgeons Borrow Old Farmers Technique in Blood Transfusions

MIAMI—(AP)—Surgeons have borrowed a page from the farmer's book in speeding the transfusion of blood, the Southern Medical Assn. was told this week.

Describing the need for speed and completeness of blood replacement in cases of hemorrhage and shock which are possible during childbirth, Dr. Curtis J. Lund of New Orleans said was experience had demonstrated that "massive" transfusions can be given quickly and safely.

'Stripping'
 "A simple method of 'stripping' the rubber tube through which the blood flows, somewhat like a farmer milks a cow," he said, "quickly forces the blood into the patient's veins. A pint of blood can be given in five minutes through a single unit."

Sometimes two or three units are used simultaneously. With such technique, mothers have received as much as 15 pints of blood. This means that their total volume of blood (a little more than nine pints) has been completely replaced once and nearly so a second time.

Enforce Transfusion
 Doctors said that compressed air pressure could enforce the transfusion of a pint of blood in even less time than "milking"—but they said transfusion of a point without any pressure at all would require anywhere from 15 minutes to one hour, depending upon the size of the needle employed.

(They pointed out that war experience had shown that large amounts of blood could be transfused quickly—and with safety.)

He reported successful blood transfusions in six cases of shock and hemorrhages associated with childbirth, saying the mothers received anywhere from seven to 15 pints of blood.

"Without such massive transfusions," Lund said, "it is doubtful whether any of the mothers would have lived."

The association, at its 42nd annual meeting, also heard a report on further progress in a technique employing metallic tantalum mesh for the repair of large ruptures of the abdominal wall. The technique, reported by Dr. Amos R. Koonz of Baltimore, is somewhat similar to patching a hole in your screen door.

Workers Not Check Happy

PALM SPRINGS, Calif.—(AP)—Are American workers too paycheck conscious? Too interested in the almighty dollar?

Not at all, according to Dilman M. K. Smith, vice-president of Opinion Research, Inc., Princeton, N. J.

He told a labor relations conference of the Los Angeles Merchants and Manufacturers' Assn. that a national survey disclosed the paycheck ranked seventh among the worker's job interests.

Ahead of it are such items as job satisfaction, interesting work, company interest in him, a chance to advance, good working conditions and congenial surroundings.

State Forester Favors Reforestation Spending

SALEM—(AP)—State Forester N. S. Rogers said Friday he would recommend spending \$250,000 a year for reforestation of the \$10,000,000 bond issue for reforestation passes at next Tuesday's election.

Rogers estimated the bond issue would cost the average citizen 90 cents a year.

"Professional foresters think it is a good opportunity to stabilize the forest wealth and income from timber at a reasonable price. It would not be in keeping with Oregon's modern forest program to pass it up," Rogers said.

Whale Battle In Antarctic

WASHINGTON—(AP)—An international scramble for whales is about to start in the strategic Antarctic.

A Russian flotilla of 13 vessels already is en route there with the announced intention of doing "large-scale scientific research" in addition to killing 2500 whales for their oil and meat.

Argentina, which is claiming a large segment of the Antarctic continent, has ordered an ultra-modern 20,000 ton factory ship, the "Juan Peron" fitted out in Britain. It is expected to be equipped with patrol aircraft.

Sends Ships
 American officials reported that Norway is sending nine factory ships, accompanied by scores of smaller "catcher" boats. Japan, Britain, The Netherlands and South Africa also are sending ships to the world's large remaining major whaling area.

Together they probably will bag 25,000 whales during the official hunting season which opens Dec. 8 and extends to late March.

They Really Don't Know

ATHENS, Ga.—(AP)—A University of Georgia professor has concluded that when people ask "where in the world is that?" they mean it.

Dr. Merle Prunty, head of the geography department, found in a recent test of 217 first year students that only 66 per cent could locate Berlin on an outline map.

The 5,000,000 square miles that make up Siberia could be found by only 55 per cent. Nineteen per cent could find Rio de Janeiro. Six per cent couldn't even find Georgia.

Dr. Prunty said the names of 25 places appearing most commonly in the news were used for the test. He said the students were selected as those whose "reactions would be most nearly typical of that of the general public."

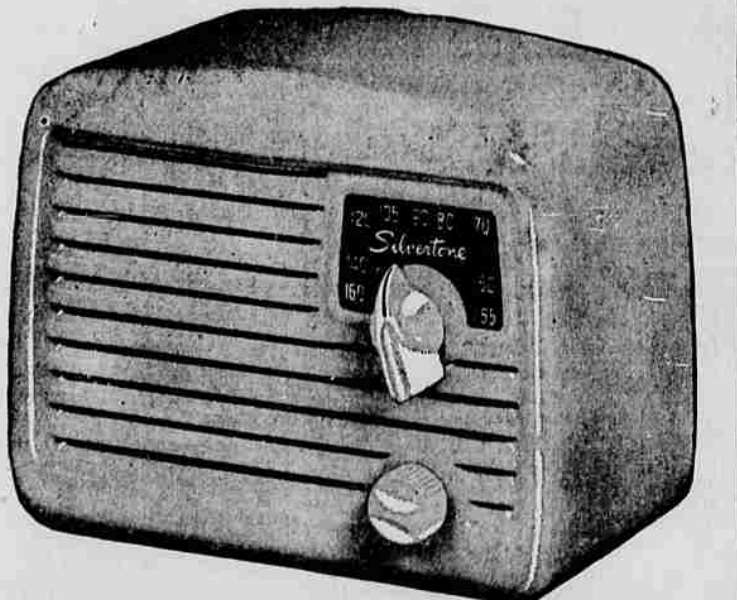
