NLRB to Follow Lead

PORTLAND, Ore. —(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board will follow President Truman's instructions to administer the Taft-Hartley Law as fairly, objectively and efficiently as possible, board member James J. Reynolds, Jr. said Saturday.

Reynolds, on a tour of the western regional offices, said Mr. Truman gave the instructions 14 months ago.

Bureau Eyes New Congress

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The Reclamation Bureau this week was reported eyeing the new Democratic-controlled Congress as a means of getting more money and freedom from restrictions imposed by Republicans this year.

In his campaign speeches President Truman berated the Republican-controlled Congress time and again for its action on reclamation.

Restore Cut

He asked the special summer session to change the appropriations act for the bureau — to add the \$35,000,000 which was cut off his request and to remove restrictions which were tied to the funds voted. His plea was ignored.

Whether for this reason or another, 12 of the 17 states where the bureau operates voted Democratic.

Advise Changes

His campaign indicates Mr. Truman certainly may again make recommendations for the changes quickly after the new Congress meets Jan. 3.

And, an informed person close to the bureau told a reporter there will be need for quick action on more funds.

Five Projects

He said the money voted for five big projects — which was less than Mr. Truman asked — is close to running out. It was appropriated to last until June 30.

He listed the projects as: Columbia Basin in Washington for which \$50,000,000 was asked and \$45,312,000 granted; Central Valley, California, \$47,186,000 asked and \$41,358,900 granted; Davis Dam, Arizona - Nevada, \$25,427,000 asked and \$22,125,000 granted; Colorado-Big Thompson, Colorado, \$23,000,000 asked and \$20,225,000 granted; and Missouri Basin, \$63,900,000 asked and \$54,786,650 granted.

Der Bingle Feeds the Kids

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—The orphan boys of St. Vincent's Catholic School will dine on the most expensive steak—more than \$12 a pound—in the United States through the courtesy of crooner Bing Crosby.

Der Bingle, who also favors himself a judge of horseflesh, paid a record \$13,475 at charity auction Friday for the prize summer yearling steer, "Acacia," of the Grand National Livestock Exposition.

The final per pound price, \$12.25, was the second highest price ever paid for a fat show steer in the United States.

Science Editor Guest Of Knife and Forks

Dr. Gerald Wendt, editor of the new science magazine "Science Illustrated" and consulting editor of "The March of Time," will be the guest speaker of the Eugene Knife and Fork Club Monday, Nov. 15. His subject will be "Horizon in Science."

His talk will cover a host of new improvements and sources of what people eat, wear and use, and new industries and changes of patterns in American communities. This latest information has been studied and developed under laboratory research.

Erika Mann To Speak Here

A distinguished author, foreign correspondent, radio news analyst, playwright, and actress is Erika Mann, who will speak on the University of Oregon campus Thursday, Nov. 11.

Miss Mann, the daughter of Thomas Mann, will speak on "Occupation—Trial and Error," at a public assembly in McArthur court at 7:30 p.m.

Miss Mann is considered a leader of democratic thought and action. Her interpretation of the significance of current events in Europe is considered not only realistic but also ideological. Immediately preceding the war Miss Mann traveled through Europe wherever the tension was greatest. She visited Republican Spain, Czechoslovakia at the time of the Munich crisis, and was in London during the Blitz. From 1943-44 she was the only woman correspondent in the Middle East.

Sponsoring Miss Mann's appearance is Eugene is the assembly committee of the University of Oregon under the chairmanship of Dr. Dan E. Clark.

Highways Now 'Throughways'

PORTLAND —(AP)—Most Oregon major highways now are "throughways" and business encroachment along them has been halted.

The State Highway Commission made the designation, but exempt from the restriction are those areas where 10 or more business establishments per mile area already in operation.

Among the many highways designated by the commission are Pacific Highway East and West, Columbia River Highway, Old Oregon Trail, Central Oregon Highway, The Dalles-California Highway, Oregon Coast Highway, Santiam Highway and numerous others.

As a result, new roadside businesses will be unable to use the main highways as direct access roads.

Unanimous The commission's action was unanimous, following recommendation by Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock and Commission Attorney J. H. Devers.

This was one of several actions based on long-range planning, options are to be taken looking toward widening S. W. Canyon Road, west out of Portland, to six lanes although no work may be done on the route for perhaps 10 years. Options also were ordered taken on property along the route of the proposed Sullivan Gulch highway, the new route into Portland from the east which may be built in two or three years.

The commission rejected a Klamath Falls request for early construction of a by-pass through that city. The state has a right-of-way for a by-pass but does not plan construction now.

City Park The Oakridge city park will be expanded through a trade made by the commission and Pope & Talbot. The latter offered 13.6 acres to the state for a rock crusher site in exchange for 2.31 acres which the firm will donate to Oakridge.

The coast highway south from the Scottsburg Inn for three and a half miles will be widened under a \$150,000 project approved by the commission.

Europe Won't Get Shipments

PORTLAND, Ore. —(AP)—There will be no Pacific Northwest fruit shipments to Europe this year, the Oregonian reported this week.

The newspaper said fruit industry leaders had hoped to restore export markets for apples and pears through the European Recovery Program, with American loans enabling foreign countries to buy.

But Dr. F. A. Motz, economist from the Department of Agriculture, was quoted as saying the recovery program officials rejected the idea.

Imports will be limited to what was termed "essential" recovery goods — mostly machinery, Dr. Motz was quoted.

JOB GOES BEGGING WORCESTER, Mass. — (AP)—Probate Court here has a \$5300-a-year "orphan" job. The post is first assistant register of probate, a position declined so far by three lawyers. All said they felt their present connections offered a more promising future than the assistant registership.

Serve in Canada? You Get Reward

The Canadian Government is trying to locate United States citizens who served in the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II and who have not applied for "war service gratuities" to which they are entitled, according to the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs.

Eligible veterans or their next of kin—including widow, children, parents, brothers or sisters—should apply to The Air Member Canadian Joint Staff, 1760 N. Street, N. W. Washington 6, D. C.

The Canadian war service gratuity, or bonus, pays \$7.50 for every 30 days service in the RCAF plus 25 cents a day for overseas service. On top of this it pays, for each six months' period overseas, an amount equal to seven days' pay and allowance based on rank held at the time of discharge.

Marine Corps Birthday Noted in Proclamation

The United States Marine Corps and its reserve components will celebrate its 175 years of service Wednesday, Nov. 10, and Eugene's mayor, Earl P. McNutt has issued a proclamation urging Eugene citizens to observe it in honor of the men and women of the Marine Corps.

Charges Filed Against Unions

PORTLAND —(AP)—Charges of violating the National Labor Relations Act were filed against three CIO Coos Bay maritime unions here Friday.

The National Labor Relations Board asked an injunction in federal court against the unions—the longshoremen and warehousemen's union, the marine cooks and stewards and the marine firemen, Oilers, Watertenders and Wipers Assn.

They were accused of persuading employees of the Coos Bay Booming Co. and other transportation firms to boycott products of the Irwin-Lyons Lumber Co. at North Bend.

The unions prevented loading of the company-owned ship, Rolando, last September, the NLRB complaint said.
