SP Engine Hits Trainman's Car

A Southern Pacific brakeman was sent to the Eugene Hospital early Saturday after the car he was driving was hit by a Southern Pacific locomotive at the Garfield St. grade crossing at 12:40 a.m.

Gordon Ware, 2073 Roosevelt, suffered several rib fractures when his car was carried approximately 55 feet and then thrown clear of the locomotive. Shortly after he was taken to the hospital in an ambulance his car caught fire and the city fire department was called to extinguish the blaze.

David Chase, Springfield, who was at the throttle of the locomotive, told police that he saw Ware's car approaching the crossing and assumed that he would stop. Although he put on emergency brakes when he saw the car directly ahead, it was too late to avoid a collision. Chase estimated that he was traveling 20 miles an hour as he approached the grade crossing.

Schools Invite Parents to Visit During National Education Week

Monday will open National Education Week, and together with schools all over the country, Eugene and other Lane County schools are putting plans in motion to help further acquaint their communities with the educational programs they are pursuing.

Superintendent Clarence Hines of the Eugene school system noted Saturday that public schools are always open to public inspection and visits by parents and other interested citizens are always welcome.

Teachers Helping

"However," Hines added, "it is especially appropriate that the public be particularly invited to the schools during National Education Week."

In School District No. 4 preparation for the week's observance has been handled by the Eugene Teachers' Assn. headed by Russell Tompkins.

Store Displays

Arrangements have been made for a number of downtown stores to feature window displays prepared by youngsters at the various schools. Programs have been planned at the schools for open house crowds during the week, and a number of community leaders contacted for special messages to be published in conjunction with the observance.

Typical of the programs to be presented at the various schools are those on which specific information was available Saturday:

At Woodrow Wilson Junior High—open house will be held Tuesday starting at 7:30 p.m. for all parents and others interested. Classroom displays and exhibits of shop work will be shown and a musical program later in the evening will feature the school band, the ninth grade choir, seventh grade choir and the boys' quintet.

At Collin Kelly Junior High—open house will be held Friday beginning at 7:30 p.m. Parents will participate in a six-period schedule of classroom explanations of the instruction programs offered to their children. This will be followed with refreshments and a short assembly program.

At University High—open house Monday at 7:30 p.m. will feature a radio play, music by the school choir, refreshments and visits with the teaching staff.

At Whiteaker Grade School—the school's annual bean supper will be Friday beginning at 6:30 p.m.

At Bailey Hill Grade School—parents are invited to visit classes Friday in advance of a 2:30 p.m. P-TA meeting.

At Lincoln Grade School—open house will be held Tuesday and National Education Week will be the theme of a Wednesday P-TA meeting at 7:30 p.m.

At Washington Grade School—open house will be held in conjunction with a Wednesday P-TA meeting at 2:30 p.m. and parents are urged to visit the school anytime during the week.

At Santa Clara Grade School—P-TA meeting Tuesday with open house for all who wish to attend. Posters and advertising have been prepared to help emphasize the importance of education in this period of national observance.

Board to Study Campus Needs

Directors of the Eugene Water Board will meet Monday night with a request for the construction of a new 3000 kilovolt-ampere substation to meet the increasing use of electricity on the University of Oregon campus.

Meeting in regular session at 7:30 p.m. in the city hall Water Board offices, the directors will hear engineer's explanations of the new substation which will cost approximately \$48,000 if its construction is authorized.

Problems connected with this week's annexation of the South Willamette and South Friendly St. districts also will be viewed by the Water Board at this meeting. Acquisition of the South Willamette Water District's facilities and their incorporation in the municipal system will be discussed.

Another major topic of Monday night's meeting will be the problem of financing further improvements in the city water system. At present, with more than a million dollars being invested in a new filtration plant and pipeline from Hayden Bridge, the water utility system is being forced to use all available fund reserves. With additional work needed to expand the distribution system, the board will need to decide how best this work can be financed.

Crazed Man Kills Eight, Self

CHESTER, Pa., (AP)—A crazed man, armed with a rifle spitting dum-dum bullets, killed eight persons and wounded three others Saturday from behind a second-floor barricade in a Chester Tenement district.

The mad killer terrorized the neighborhood for more than an hour before he turned the rifle on himself as police infiltrated a tear-gas fog to reach his room.

The gunman, Melvin Collins, 38, Exmore, Va., was found dead on the floor with a bullet through his neck.

All the dead were Negroes, except one white man killed as he tried to scramble from his automobile parked outside the rooming house. And all but Mrs. Louis Moore, 40, died almost instantly. She succumbed in Chester hospital from a bullet wound of the head nine hours after the shooting.

Deaf-Mute Speaks

A deaf-mute, the third man cut down by the demented man's rifle, was shocked into uttering the first words he had spoken in years. As he staggered up to a police car, Samuel Lytle gasped, "I've been shot." Then he fell dead.

Edison Wing Plans Approved; Erdman to Supervise Program

At a special meeting of the Eugene School Board Friday night preliminary plans for a two-room addition to Edison Grade School were approved.

In another action in conjunction with the school district's current expansion program, the board Friday night directed L. L. Erdmann, principal of the Eugene Vocational School, to spend part of his time supervising school construction projects. A former contractor himself, Erdmann also is an engineering graduate of Oregon State College.

The board also acted to appoint W. R. Robertson as the school district's representative in appraising property to be purchased for additions to the Bailey Hill school.

Further consideration of the \$3,750,000 building program approved by the taxpayers at a special election last month came with advice from bonding companies that the district should not offer bond issues in amounts of less than \$1,000,000 at a time. The plan to finance the construction of new schools and the enlargement of certain existing schools in the Eugene district involves a \$2,500,000 bond authority. Better interest rates will be obtained, the bonding companies reported to the school board, if large bonding companies are interested in the sales and enter bids.
