Assn. to continue its program
against this deadly disease.

University of Oregon students
have been learning of the work of
this year's seal sale through health
education classes. Students have
learned through term projects of
some class members how money
derived from the seal sale is used
to combat tuberculosis and pro-
mote a better health program. It
is the seal sale that pays for the in-
creased use of the X-ray units
which travel over the country and
make X-ray service available to
all persons without charge.
