WASHINGTON — (AP) — The name of Harold Ickes, the "old man" of the New Deal, was mentioned in widespread reports of impending cabinet changes.

Truman hasn't said a word about the rumor, but the rumor is that he is considering it.

Campaign Work

A favorite topic of conversation for weeks has been the degree of campaign activity on the part of the various cabinet members — with the exception of Secretary of State Marshall and Secretary of Defense Forrestal.

These two, because of the bipartisan foreign policy and neutral international situation, never had been expected to do any plugging for Mr. Truman.

Wide Range

Otherwise the range spread from the all-out efforts of such cabinet officers as Secretary of Labor Tobin and Secretary of Agriculture Brannan down to the political inactivity of Secretary of the Treasury Snyder.

But in Snyder's case, there has been no suggestion that Mr. Truman ever had suggested or even wanted him to do any campaigning. Snyder is not regarded as a particularly smooth politician.

And while he may leave the cabinet sooner or later to take a better paying job, it seems most likely that he will be the only reason Snyder rode back to Washington with Mr. Truman from St. Louis.

And word passed along to newsmen on the presidential train was that Snyder will be pressed to remain on.

No "Reprisals"

At the same time, these reporters were told that Mr. Truman is not interested in any "reprisal" dismissals.

Nevertheless, a post-election conversation piece has been the reported appearance of some administration lesser lights at Republican "victory" parties on Tuesday night.

There's even talk that if and when Forrestal quits the defense post Ickes might be put in that job for a while to "knock heads together" and get the Army-Navy unification job finished. Ickes has a reputation for head-knocking.

Forrestal, Lovett

Forrestal will not be pressed to stay on, nor will Undersecretary of State Robert A. Lovett, the newsmen with Mr. Truman were given to understand.

Lovett caused some raising of eyebrows last week when he said Marshall had learned of a presidential statement on Palestine only after Mr. Truman had decided to issue it.

Possibilities

Dean Acheson and Will Clayton, two former undersecretaries, have been mentioned as likely possibilities; along with European Recovery Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and GOP Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan.

Vandenberg will surrender his foreign relations committee chairmanship to Democrat Tom Connally of Texas come Jan. 3.

For nearly any vacancy that comes up, Mr. Truman may give a good deal of consideration to his good friend Mon C. Wallgren, who lost his bid for re-election as governor of Washington state Tuesday.

Mr. Truman has proposed a 10th cabinet post for a new department of public welfare to handle such things as social security.

Betting Ban Held Invalid

PORTLAND — (AP) — Portland's city ordinance against book-making and racing pools was held invalid this week by three circuit court judges.

The judges ruled that the ordinance conflicts with the state racing act. The city regulation prohibits bookmaking except in the enclosure of a state-licensed racing meet, whereas the state law does not restrict such activities to the exact place where the race is run.

They declared that under the 1933 state racing act, pool-selling, bookmaking, and wagering on races where the pari-mutuel system of betting is employed "can no longer be deemed public nuisances and a crime under the law."

They added that the question of whether such activities are in the public interest is a matter for the legislature, not the courts, to decide.

Bend Commissioners Name New Mayor

BEND — (AP) — T. D. Sexton is the new mayor of Bend in a city government turnover from last Tuesday's election.

The voters' recall of five city commissioners left only two men — Sexton and W. J. Baer — on the commission and nobody as city manager or police chief.

The latter two appointees, who had been backed by the recalled commissioners, resigned after the election.

Sexton and Baer appointed five new commissioners, and called them to a special meeting Friday night to name new city officials.

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Black Market Cigarettes Said Source of Sergeant's Fortune

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — (AP) — An Air Force sergeant and his wife told police Monday that they swapped 1500 cartons of American cigarettes in Vienna for the estimated \$100,000 worth of fine furs, furniture and jewelry found in their modest bungalow here.

Master Sgt. Wiley Clyde Walters, 40, a veteran of 15 years in the Army, and his wife Miriam, 42, were held for investigation. Police said federal agents probably would want to investigate the possibility that the couple evaded payment of import duties on the valuables obtained in the European black market.

Narcotics, Ivory Included

Among the treasure crammed into their house were crates of ivory and silver figurines, antiques, valuable paintings in gold frames, fox fur sets, a quantity of narcotics and a grand piano.

Walters and his wife were taken into custody Saturday night after she aroused the suspicions of a jeweler to whom she tried to sell an elaborate diamond ring. Police Chief I. D. Bruce said Walters was "too drunk to be questioned" when arrested.

\$100,000-\$200,000 Loot

Bruce estimated the value of the loot to be at least \$100,000 and possibly as high as \$200,000, but he said it would take an antique expert to determine the exact value of the furniture and the art objects. Unpacked crates of goods filled two whole rooms, he said.

The grand piano had been set up in the parlor. Costly rugs adorned the floors. Gold framed pictures all but filled the wall space, and empty gold frames were stacked in corners.

Police found dozens of gems in the pockets of the couple's clothing hanging in closets. Jewels also were found under the seat of the Walters' Italian Fiat automobile, and in odd corners of the house.

Valuable fur pieces were found stuffed into pillow cases. In the kitchen, six French poodles guarded a cache of narcotics concealed in an Air Force emergency kit.

Walters told police he bought the cigarettes "from a New York outfit" when he went overseas, and by selling them for \$50 a carton parlayed them into a fortune in costly merchandise.
