Texans in Air Over 3 Weeks

LONGVIEW, Tex. —(AP)—Two Texans attempting to double the present world flight endurance record went past the 516-hour mark at 6:01 a. m. Thursday, a half-day more than three weeks in the air.

Pred Vinmont and Bert Simons, both of Dallas, reported they were in excellent health and that their plane was humming along in splendid condition.

The two former Air Force pilots seek to beat the mark of 728 hours set in 1934 by Al and Fred Key over Meridian, Miss. The Dallas flyers have only a few hours more than a week to go to equal that mark.

said, would bring Wong, deputy premier Chang Li-Sheng and Defense Minister Ho Ying-Chin together daily to coordinate military and civil affairs.

Rigid censorship was declared. Foreign newsmen as well as domestic were placed under the censorship rule. Under martial law Chinese officials may use either post-publication or pre-publication censorship.

As the great battle raged just 170 miles northwest of here, all American military groups moved out their wives and children. They were flown to the American-controlled port of Tainingao northeast of here and Shanghai.

Other foreigners were growing restless. British, French, Australian and other consulates in Shanghai said they had no evacuation orders. They indicated an emergency plan had been worked out in Shanghai to be effected if the situation got worse. All admitted that a good many of their nationals were leaving voluntarily, which accounted for a tremendous increase in bookings at air and seaplanes.

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The first major shipment of American guns and ammunition to China since the Communist sweep in Manchuria was said Thursday to be nearly ready for departure.

The report lacked details and official confirmation. But it came from both Chinese and American sources after the state department disclosed that more than \$12,000,000 has been withdrawn by China from the \$125,000,000 Congress voted this year for military assistance.

Most of the money had been paid over to the army for arms, ammunition, vehicles and radios which the Nationalist government has said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist forces must have to stem the Communist advance in North China. Shipments thus far have been confined largely to equipment rather than actual weapons and ammunition, informants said.

The Defense Department has authority from President Truman to help China by turning over supplies from U. S. military stocks. The Chinese must pay what it costs to replace the supplies.

CIO Meets West Coast Shipowners for Parley

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—Officials of the CIO Longshoremen's Union met West Coast shipowners Thursday in the first direct negotiations since the 71-day-old maritime strike began.

The waterfront employers' association announced late Wednesday night that it would renew negotiations for the first time since Sept. 2. The WEA said negotiations would be directly between union and employer committees.

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Navy Hunts Sub Close to Hawaii

PEARL HARBOR —(AP)—The Navy is trying to confirm reports that a foreign submarine was operating within a few miles of this Pacific fleet headquarters Wednesday.

A submarine rescue vessel, the USS Bluebird, reported a possible contact nine miles south of Pearl Harbor. First reports to headquarters did not indicate whether the Bluebird sighted the undersea craft or picked it up by sound detection.

Other fleet units were sent out to search the area. No American submarines were in the same waters at the time.

There was a flurry of foreign submarine reports last April. Secretary of Navy Sullivan announced that submarines not belonging to any nation west of the "Iron Curtain" had been sighted in the Pacific—none nearer than 200 miles from the West Coast.

Russia Seeks Five New Trade Treaties

MOSCOW —(AP)—The Soviet government currently is negotiating for trade pacts with delegations from five foreign countries. The latest trade groups to arrive came to Moscow Wednesday from Poland and Finland. An Italian delegation has been in Moscow for several months. More recent arrivals were delegations from Yugoslavia and Bulgaria.

Allied Zones Prepare For German Strike

FRANKFURT, Germany —(AP)—The American and British occupation zones prepared Thursday for a general strike that threatens to be Germany's largest since 1923.

The 24-hour stoppage, set for Friday, may tie up 12,000,000 workers. It has been called to protest high prices.

SPRINGFIELD —Members of Springfield's IWA local 5-248 will meet at 8 p. m. Friday in the union hall, Old Oregon Bank Building, to take action on proposed amendments to the international constitution. Policy will be set on a teamsters strike in Eugene.

Ex-Servicemen's Help Needed To Support 'Operation Vittles'

Ten thousand former servicemen are needed immediately as replacements by the United States Air Force for assignment to the United Kingdom and Western Europe in support of "Operation Vittles" and the current B-29 training program, according to Col. F. C. Dahlquist, Oregon Recruiting District.

Qualified veterans will be accepted for enlistment in grades commensurate with their ability and military experience. Skills needed include aircraft maintenance, radio, radar, communications and automotive equipment operators and repairmen.

Unmarried veterans up to 34 years of age who have been discharged more than 90 days will be accepted in all grades up to and including technical sergeant. Married men who have been discharged from the Air Force more than 90 days must qualify for grades of staff sergeant and technical sergeant to be accepted. Dependents of these men cannot be sent overseas.

Air Force men reenlisting within 90 days of their discharge automatically receive their former grade. All men accepted will receive an extra 20 per cent in pay for service outside the United States.

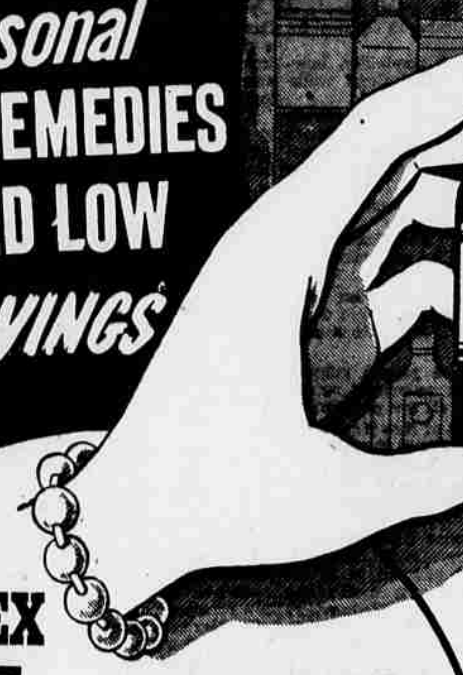
