regional and other collective arrangements for individual and collective self-defense in accordance with the purposes, principles and provisions of the (United Nations) charter. "Association of the United States, by constitutional process, with such . . . arrangements as are based on continuous and effective self-help and mutual aid, and as affect its national security."

It was under that rather vague mandate that the Truman administration began talks with Western European nations about their arms needs. These talks are about to be stepped up—perhaps with 12 instead of the original seven nations taking part.

Administration leaders made it plain that, while they had few doubts about his views, they are happy to have this public word.

To them Vandenberg apparently again has become the top GOP spokesman on foreign policy—a role he naturally yielded during the campaign to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the party's presidential nominee.

Democrats also figure that since the election Vandenberg is going to have less Republican opposition in the Senate to administration proposals he backs.

To support this, they point out that six Republican senators who voted against the European Recovery Plan last March will be replaced by Democrats in January.

They argue this result may have some effect on six other Republicans who voted against the plan but didn't have to run this year.

In the House, some of the chief Republican critics of foreign policy bit the election dust. The Democrats think others who returned may be more cooperative than in the past.

"Our schools furnish the finest medium for educating the public in the fundamentals of traffic safety," Roberts stated. He cited four points in support of this contention.

1. It is possible (in the schools) to make safety an integral part of the daily thinking of the young people who will in a few years be operating motor vehicles on our streets and highways.

2. Students constitute a considerable segment of the pedestrian traffic.

Oregon Baptists Say 'Door Open'

PORTLAND, Ore. —(U.P.)— The Oregon Baptist Convention which refused to seat delegations from 51 "conservative churches" Thursday said, "the door is open for them," as the convention ended. The ousted group had said it would form its own organization, meeting at the Hinson Memorial Baptist Church, instead of joining the parent convocation.

Resolution

On Armistice Day, the original convention resolved:

To "regret if any unjust statements have been made concerning them (the conservatives) on the convention floor in the heat of debate, and that we do respect them as our brethren in Christ though differing from them in policy."

"We convey to such churches our earnest desire to co-operate with them in all areas where we can act in harmony for the extension of the cause of Christ."

"That we assure such churches that the door is open for them to be restored to good standing on terms mutually acceptable to them and to us."

Missed Announcement

Most of the conservative church delegates had gone home when the announcement came after appointing a seven-man advisory board.

Rev. Harold Jacobson of Grace Baptist Church in Portland was elected president of the original convention, replacing Mrs. M. B. Hodge.

President Dr. Harry L. Dillin of Baptist Linfield College said he "lamented" the division but the position of Linfield "will be more clarified."

School Children May View Art

John Davis Hatch, On Dec. 1, starting time will probably be 7 a.m. to insure arrival at the museum by 11 a.m. School parties must finish their tour before noon because afternoon and evening time is for adults.

There are 96 of the world's most famous paintings in the German collection, including ten Rembrandts, five Titians, four Franz Hals; Correggio's "Leda and the Swan" and a representation from all the great masters of every age. The collection is insured for \$80,000,000 and travels under Army guards.

During the early days of World War II, the paintings were stored in a deep bombproof shelter in Berlin. As the fall of Berlin drew near, they were spirited to South Germany to escape the Russians and were hidden in the salt mines, where American occupation forces found them.

Through the influence of Senator Wayne L. Morse, Portland was designated as the only city in the Northwest where the paintings will be shown. The exhibit will be open from Nov. 25 through Dec. 3. Adults may visit any afternoon or evening, but schools are required to come in supervised parties before noon each day.

"It is a marvelous opportunity for the people of the Northwest," said Professor Hatch, former director of the Albany, New York Museum Institute of History and Art. "Only 10 cities in the United States could be permitted to have this exhibit. After this tour the pictures must be returned to Germany. This is an opportunity to see works which one would have to travel to Germany to see."

A small admission fee (less than 50 cents for adults) is charged at the Museum, all of the proceeds going to a fund to help German children. Mr. Lobaugh said if there were any surplus from the charter of buses he would suggest it be donated to the fund for German children.

School children making the trip must have \$3.30 for bus fare, and pocket money for lunch at Portland. Illustrated books on the art collection will also be on sale at the museum. Bus should return children to Eugene before dinner time.

Bonneville Cuts Power to Plants

PORTLAND, Ore. —(U.P.)— Bonneville Power Administration Friday announced cutbacks in power which will cut production at four Pacific Northwest aluminum plants an estimated 20,000 tons.

The slash in electricity to industry will total 82,000 kilowatts, according to Paul Raver, administrator, who said a growing power shortage was the reason for the short ration.

Plants affected are the Aluminum Co. of America, Vancouver, Wash.; Kaiser Metals Corp., Spokane, Wash.; Reynolds Aluminum Longview, Wash., and the Electro Metallurgical Co., Portland, Above Listings

The power to be turned off is above the amount listed in firm power contracts, Raver said, and the trimming will be carried out unless something unforeseen happens.

"Immediate cutbacks in Bonneville's power load are being forced by the serious drop in stream levels of the Lower Columbia and Snake River basins," Raver said.

"There is little prospect any of the present cuts can be restored until next spring in view of the growing loads of Bonneville firm contract power," he added.

Police Seek 'Meanest Man'

OAKRIDGE—Local and state police still are investigating the theft of \$47 from the Oasis Tavern here by "the meanest man in town."

The thief (or thieves) broke into the tavern, police reported, and rifled the money box. But he (or they) also took several one dollar bills from the walls, where they had been posted as part of a community Christmas fund.

Police said they broke a plate glass window in the door of the tavern with a rock, and then apparently unlatched the night lock. The burglary occurred early Wednesday morning.

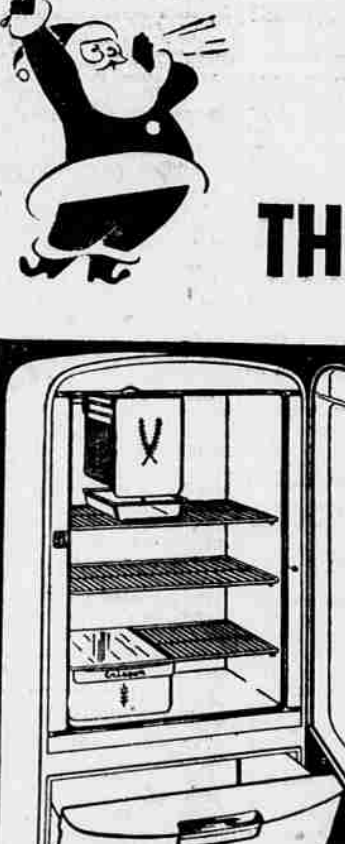
