# Paul Womer Is New Mayor for City of Florence

FLORENCE — Paul Womer is new city mayor, following action this week's session of the city council, when Kenneth B. Spencer, tendered his resignation because of recently moving outside the city limits.

Womer has served on the city council since 1938, beginning as parks and docks commissioner. In 1940 he was elected water commissioner, a post he has held the past eight years, being re-elected at the recent general election. The matter of appointing a water commissioner was deferred for further consideration.
