LaBrucherie Praises Ducks

Again in the second period the Webfoots threatened without scoring, moving to the 30 and Hunt intercepted Van's touchdown pass to Wilkins on the one. The Webfoots were starting to roll again just before the final gun, with Bunny Easter piloting a 35-yard movement which ended in UCLA territory.

We sat in Commissioner Victor Schmidt's PCC office on South Spring Street Friday as he thumbed through reams of minutes and notes in an attempt to answer a question presented to him in Eugene a week ago—can Oregon accept another bowl bid if the Webfoots fail to gain the Pasadena classic?

Third Party

Grove Topples Lebanon 34-12

Lions End Undeclared Season Marred By Tie

LEBANON, Nov. 13—Coach Bob Dusenberry's Cottage Grove Lions took a little of the shine off of Lebanon's Tri-County League trophy here Friday night, rolling up a handsome 34-12 victory in the last game of the season for both schools.

Last week, Lebanon showed a lot of power in rolling over University High 21-13 to win the league title. Cottage Grove tied the University High for the Southern Division crown, but UHS won the right to play for the title because of statistical superiority.

So, Lebanon keeps the title, but the Groves take the glory. The victory gives Cottage Grove an undefeated season. Only a 7-7 tie with University kept it from forcing the district championship—won by Albany with a perfect record—into a playoff.

Score After Kickoff

Larry Anderson chalked up the first Cottage Grove touchdown on a 30-yard jaunt. Rollo Bush had taken the opening kickoff from his own 15 to Lebanon 40. Three plays made it a first down on the 30, from where Anderson swung into high gear. The conversion attempt was good.

Bush made the second Grove touchdown, going the last 15 yards of a 58-yard march. The conversion was again good.

At this stage of the game, Lebanon opened up with a passing attempt. Don Hebert threw two passes in a row to Jerry Bartels, the second good for 30-yards and a score. The point-after-touchdown try failed, giving Cottage Grove a 14-6 lead at the end of the first period.

Add Another

In the second quarter Grove added another score, Anderson going over on an end sweep. The touchdown was set up by a 10-yard pass from Bush to Harlan Mickey. Four plays later Anderson converted for a 21-6 halftime lead.

Use Ground Game

Bush, who was the leading performer in the Grove backfield despite his small size, ran the Lebanon kickoff back 85-yards for the next to last Grove touchdown.

Bush also tallied again with 20 seconds left in the game on an off-tackle smash.

Grove led in first downs, 13 to 10. In winning the Lions relied almost entirely on a ground game, completing only two passes. Lebanon completed four.
