S. Willamette Joining Stayed

Although voters of the city and of the two suburban areas indicated two weeks ago that they favored annexation of the South Willamette, certain legal steps remain to be taken before the sections become bona fide portions of Eugene, City Manager Deane Seeger reported Monday.

Referring to numerous inquiries received at his office, Seeger said he has pointed out that the vote in the Nov. 2 city elections must yet be canvassed by the city council. This is expected to be accomplished at next Monday night's council session.

The results of the election then must be filed with the secretary of state's office. The date this is accomplished will mark the official annexation of the new areas. The Eugene Water Board Monday reported that as the result of a meeting with officers of the South Willamette Water District, it has been decided that the EWB will read water meters in the new section of the city for the first time in December. Bills for that month then will be made on the basis of the lower rates prevailing in the city.

Service operations in the South Willamette area will be taken over by EWB crews in January. Meanwhile, the water district will proceed with the laying of certain mains according to previous plans and under the joint supervision of the district's board of directors and the Eugene Water Board.

Oregon's Local Taxes Hit High

library funds, non-high school districts, funds for bond interest and redemption.

County school and library taxes totaled \$294,569 this year and \$746,588 last year. Non-high school district taxes went down from \$1,201,871 to \$365,285. Bond interest and redemption taxes decreased from \$226,147 to \$208,224.

All road taxes went up. General road levies increased from \$1,185,863 to \$1,572,475. Market road taxes went up from \$869,675 to \$1,043,771. Road district levies were boosted from \$569,482 to \$692,570. Road taxes also are levied on property.

Other property levies included ports, up from \$593,379 to \$620,663; rural fire protection districts, up from \$548,555 to \$661,593; and miscellaneous, up from \$70,037 to \$299,403.

Special assessments include irrigation and drainage districts, down from \$1,172,340 to \$1,036,166; forest fees for reforestation, down from \$36,357 to \$36,735; and fire patrol assessments, up from \$365,093 to \$366,304.

Cascade Group To Ask Survey

SPRINGFIELD—Reports on the recent meeting with the State Highway Commission highlighted the monthly meeting of the directors of the Cascade Highway Commission Monday evening in Springfield.

Fifteen directors from three counties were present at the regular business meeting, representing several cities along the proposed route of the highway skirting the western foothills of the Cascades.

Discussion centered around further action of the group considering the two-lane freeway from Springfield-Eugene to Portland. The \$12 million figure quoted by the state highway committee was discussed and two definite steps were approved:

The Cascade Highway Assn. will ask for a preliminary survey of the proposed route in Linn County sometime in the near future and it will request the assistance of the Oregon Bureau of Roads in furthering realization of the 20-year dream for the Cascade route.

Obstacles met in previous attempts to construct the highway were listed and a move was made to contact state legislators to gain a general recognition of the Association.

The county courts of Lane and Marion counties already have endorsed the proposed plan. The brief presented before the state highway commission included as reasons for construction of the Cascade route, fire, military, logging and mill, scenic and economic advantages.

The highway, following the western foothills of the Cascade range, would be 24 to 25 miles shorter to Portland than the present route and would provide a shorter route to Bend from Oregon City.

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Police Plan Toy Repairing

Used toys will be repaired and reconditioned for distribution to Eugene's needy children again this Christmas if they can be obtained by the Eugene police department while there is still time to permit necessary repairs.

Carried on during off-duty hours by members of the police department, the Christmas toy project is an annual function.

"Last year we distributed more than a truckload of reclaimed dolls, games and miscellaneous toys," Chief Keith Jones reported Tuesday.

"But," he added, "we didn't have nearly enough to take care of all the deserving youngsters whom we knew would be missed in Santa Claus' regular deliveries."

Chief Jones said that women working in the police department are planning to make a number of rag dolls and other gift items for distribution this Christmas. The main supply, however, must come from persons outside the department, he added.

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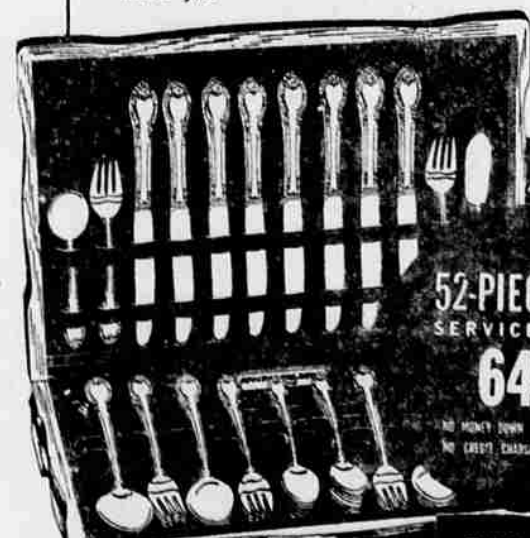
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
