

Russian Schoolteacher To End Hospital Stay

NEW YORK — (AP) — Mrs. Oksana Stepanovna Kasenkina will end her three-month stay in the hospital Friday.

The 53-year-old Russian schoolteacher has been at Roosevelt Hospital since she leaped from a third-story window of the Russian Consulate Aug. 12.

New Air Command

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force Thursday set up the Continental Air Command to direct the nation's air defense.

The super-headquarters will have over-all direction of the present Air Defense Command (the fighter force) and the Tactical Air Command (the light bomber and attack-bomber force.) The two commands will continue as operating organizations.

The activities of the Methodist church are administered from three principal headquarters in New York, Nashville, Tenn., and Chicago.

Korean Island Under Decree

SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — President Syngman Rhee Thursday proclaimed martial law in the whole province of Cheju Island, 70 miles off the coast of Korea, to suppress a revolt there "at the earliest possible time."

By presidential ordinance Rhee appointed the commander of the seventh regiment stationed in Cheju to enforce martial law.

Large scale fighting between guerrillas and police in and around Mount Ode, 70 miles east of Seoul, was reported.

Police announced that police squads and special troops of the national army were presently encircling Mount Ode.

Meanwhile government spokesman Kim Dong Sung said the withdrawal of American troops from South Korea would be disastrous and that the South Korean Government was pinning its faith on MacArthur's recent assurances.

Ellis Admits Bowers Shooting

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Butler said that Headpeth remarked on the way back to the Bowers car, that there "should be no trouble" that they would disarm the persons in the Bowers car, push them out of the ditch and return.

Butler's testimony about the shooting was hazy and mixed up. However, he did say that no persons were standing around the Bowers car when they first pulled to a stop facing it.

Stop By Car

He said they stopped "about three car lengths" from the Bowers auto.

Luehrs and Van Antwerp both gave similar testimony. Luehrs is the first witness so far that has come close to establishing that Ellis fired shots that felled Bowers.

He said there was a group of colored persons standing to the left front door of the Bowers car when they first stopped and got out of the car—that he heard a shout, "Lookout he's got a gun," that he turned around and a shot was fired. He said, "I know now that it was Ellis." Both Luehrs and Van Antwerp said they had some beer with Ellis at Crescent Lake the evening of Aug. 10.

They also both testified that Bowers had a shiny object in his hand before he was shot. According to their testimony, neither they nor Ellis examined Bowers' body after he was shot.

Whiskey Purchased

Larry Larwood, who handles whiskey sales for an Oakridge drug store (the 14th witness called by the state) identified a sales ticket signed by an Earl Bowers "at about 5 or 7 p.m." on Aug. 10 for the purchase of a fifth of Old Forester 100-proof whiskey. He could not establish that it was Earl Bowers, the deceased, who made the purchase.

The defense attorneys, on cross examination of state's witnesses, have been trying to draw out that someone in the Bowers car had purchased beer or whiskey in or near Oakridge the evening previous to the shooting. So far all the occupants of the Bowers car have vigorously denied such actions.

French Troops At Strike Dock

PARIS — (AP) — Strong forces of French troops and security guards were rushed Thursday night to Dunkerque, where 2000 striking dock workers barricaded themselves behind locked iron gates of the port.

The longshoremen's strike scheduled to paralyze all French ports next Monday already was effective at the channel port, and the situation there was described as serious.

Communist leaders of the dock workers union asked Premier Henri Queuille to receive them for a "final" talk before the Monday deadline for the strike, but all indications were that a general stoppage would tie up French ports on schedule.

Shipping Talks Hit New Snag

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — West Coast waterfront peace talks continued Thursday, but employers and strikers reported a new snag over the hiring hall.

The strike involving five unions and some 28,000 workers went into its 12th week. Both sides were optimistic over prospects of settlement.

But a joint union-employer committee at a press conference said the hiring hall issue had not been ironed out. A joint press release Tuesday said negotiators reached a "tentative agreement" to preserve union control of hiring halls, pending court decisions.

However, Wednesday Dwight C. Steele, representing employers, and President Harry Bridges of the striking CIO longshoremen said:

"We are agreed on the hiring hall principle but not agreed on the application of that principle. Our basic disagreement arises out of the Taft-Hartley Act."

Wage issues are yet to be settled. The key longshoremen's union seeks a 15 cent boost over the \$1.67 hourly basic wage.

AFL Meet Voies Political Action

CINCINNATI — (AP) — The American Federation of Labor has entered politics on a permanent basis.

Delegates to the federations 67th annual convention voted Wednesday to collect 10 cents from each of its nearly 7,500,000 members to finance a propaganda and education drive of "labor's league for political education." The delegates acted as league members because the Taft-Hartley Act forbids direct contributions.

The drive, with \$750,000 working capital, will be centered in the nation's 110,000 polling precincts during the next 14 months.

Solid Vote

The move was approved unanimously after secretary-treasurer George Meany told the delegates that 172 league-backed candidates had been elected to the House of Representatives, Nov. 2, and 106 classed as "unfriendly" were defeated.

Meany said it was "a tremendous victory" and the "tide of reaction has been decisively turned." He cautioned, however, that "we should not become overconfident . . . and forget our political responsibilities."

In other action of the day, a new move for merger with the CIO was approved. A report of the convention organization committee proposed that the door not only should be opened to the CIO but the AFL "should now reach out and grasp them by the hand and urge them to come back into the AFL." The CIO was formed by AFL unions in 1936.

House Member Dies at Home

NEW YORK — (AP) — Rep. John J. Delaney, 70, (D-N.Y.), died early Thursday at his home in Brooklyn.

Delaney had served continuously in Congress since 1931 and was reelected last month, although illness had prevented him from conducting a personal campaign. He also served his seventh district in 1917-19.

He was a member of the Naval affairs committee for seven years, and a member of the rules committee.

German Women Revolt Against Church, Kitchen, Home Formula

BERLIN — (AP) — German women are rebelling against the traditional kirche, kuche, kinder—church, kitchen, home.

The majority of male Germans still believe women belong in the home. But the women themselves are beginning to show different ideas.

For one thing, women know that many of them will never be able to marry and have homes of their own.

In all Germany, there are 7,500,000 more women than men. In the American zone, according to the 1946 census, there are 124 women to every 100 men. The difference is even greater in the marriageable ages. For every 100 men between 20 and 25 years of age there are 171 women.

Women Discouraged

This result of two wars has made women increasingly insistent that there be more opportunity for them in business, and the professions, more adequate training for girls so that they may be prepared to earn a decent livelihood.

However reluctantly, women in this man-short nation are slowly leaving their homes and kitchens for business careers.

Because of their number they will have to bear the brunt, military government officials believe, of the major part in the reconstruction of Germany.

Women of all ages hard at work clearing rubble is a common sight in this devastated city.

Tradition Holds

As they turn from Hitler's slogan of "Out of business, and back to husband, kitchen and fire-side," they also are becoming clerks, shopkeepers, secretaries, teachers, journalists.

The process is not without opposition, for military government

research shows the traditional German attitude toward women, particularly the emphasis upon having children, still holds.

An opinion survey by military government's information services division showed that Germans believe a man should have preference in any position he can fill satisfactorily.

American officials assert this attitude runs counter to reality. They say it ignores the excess number of women, the pressing need for reconstruction and export production.

Medals No Good

The "mutterkreuz" the mother's medal awarded by the Nazis to women with four children, is of little use to a war widow who must support her family, officials declare.

They see in German women a group that is learning that nationalism does not pay.

Coast Lumber Output High

PORTLAND, Ore. — (AP) — Lumber shipments from West Coast sawmills so far this year were highest for any peacetime year since 1929, H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn., said here Thursday.

Simpson said shipments this year have totalled 7,190,965,000 board feet. He said the 1941-42 totals were slightly higher.

The weekly average for October was 163,331,000 board feet. Simpson said this was more than 100 per cent above the 1942-47 average.
