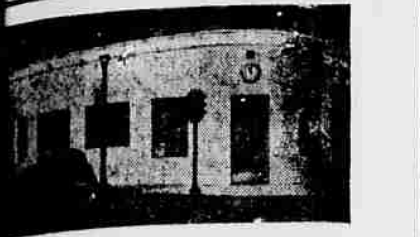


Fire Exams for January
Application blanks may be obtained any time at the city recorder's office in the city hall. Applicants must have at least two years high school education, and must conform to departmental physical standards.
Starting salary for patrolman and fireman is \$220 per month, with \$10 increases after the first year and for every year thereafter until the fourth year. The positions are governed by civil service and the public employee's retirement act, which grants retirement at 60.

Seaman Refusal Hinted by Chief

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Harry Lundberg, president of the AFL Sailors' Union of the Pacific, served notice Monday that his 30,000 seamen may refuse to return to work when the present West Coast dock strike ends.
Lundberg asserted that the tentative contract drawn up between CIO Longshoremen and Waterfront Employers "nullified" the AFL agreement for coastwise steam lumber schooners.
This dispute centers around vessels of the coastwise line which operate between Alaska and California and Oregon ports. It has been traditional for the AFL sailors to work cargo on coastwise and Alaska ships because of the absence of waterfront workers in remote Alaska ports.
Lundberg said the operators have "tentatively agreed to allow the longshoremen to do certain loading and discharging that we used to do."
A spokesman for Harry Bridges, CIO longshore chief, denied any change in the steam schooner part of the union's contract was planned. He said cargo loading in Alaska would continue to be governed by the Alaska longshore agreement, which was not affected by the strike.
Lundberg already has served wage demands on the shipowners. Operators said they would discuss wages with Lundberg as soon as they settled other maritime agreements.

Henry E. Slattery

Henry E. Slattery, 80, Eugene lawyer, died Nov. 26 at a Portland hospital after a short illness. A resident of Oregon since 1908, he practiced law from 1903 until the time of his death.
Mr. Slattery was born in Scioto County, Ohio, July 18, 1888, and educated at Coe College (then Leander Clark College) and Drake University. He returned to Coe College for his master's degree in 1903. He married Minda S. Hansen Sept. 2, 1904. They had two children, Eugene V. Slattery, and Orma Camilla Barnes. The latter died June 2, 1942.
Mr. Slattery began the practice of law in Ames, Iowa, in 1903, and served as city attorney there. He was a member of Eugene Lodge No. 11, AF and AM since 1908, and was master of the lodge in 1921. June 3, 1915 he received the 32nd degree in Eugene Consistory, Scottish Rite, and was a member of the Eugene Camp No. 17, Sons of Union Veterans.
Mr. Slattery was a member of the United Brethren Church in Iowa, and in Eugene taught a men's Bible Class at First Congregational Church for 14 years and later taught at the Methodist Church.
Surviving are his widow in Eugene; a son, Col. Eugene V. Slattery, Fort Lewis, Wash.; and one grandson, William Henry Slattery.
