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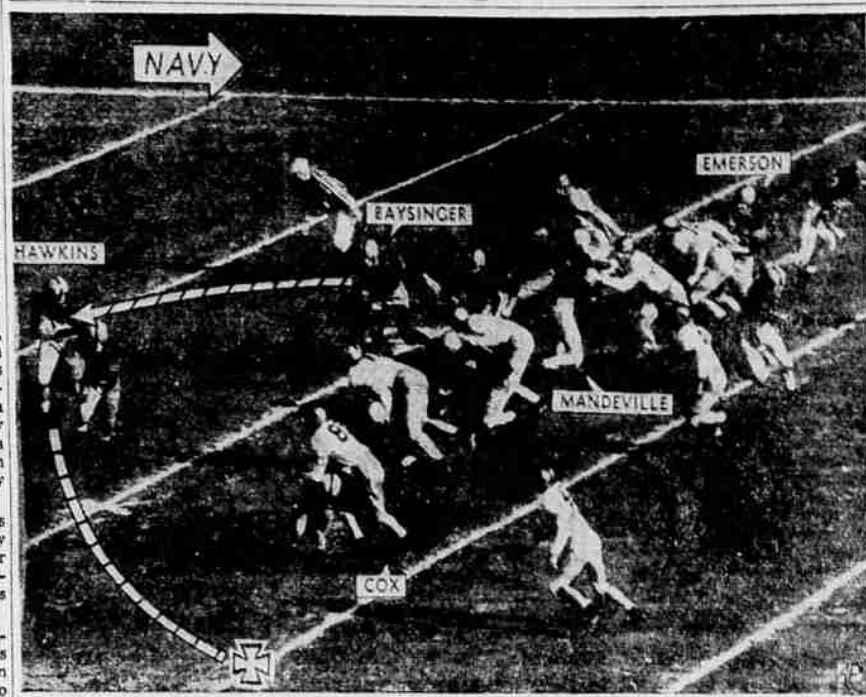

Dick Wilkins Rates Nod From UP Scribe

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(U.P.)—Final All-America football memo:

A tabulation of 11 weekly memos for the 1948 season revealed Monday that Charley Justice of North Carolina led four players from the midwest, three from the south, two from the west coast and one each from the east and southwest as the men who drew the most raves in on-the-spot-reports out of the pressboxes around the nation.

Three backs were standouts—Justice, Donk Walker or Southern Methodist, and Jackie Jensen of California. Justice was listed in our personal "backfield of the week" seven times, Walker five and Jensen four.

The fourth place in the "backfield of the year" was the standoff among Johnny Rauch of Georgia, Stan Heath of Nevada, Frank Tripucka of Notre Dame and Lou Kusserow of Columbia. I'll cast the deciding vote in favor of Tripucka, who may not get many other votes but certainly should in my book.

Most mentioned linemen of the year were Dick Rifenburg of Michigan and Dick Wilkins of Oregon at the ends; Leo Nomellini of Minnesota and Al Derogatis of Duke at the tackles; Bill Healy of Georgia Tech and Bill Fischer of Notre Dame at the guards, and Chuck Bednarik of Pennsylvania at center.

Runnersup in the tabulation: "Backs—Heath, Rauch, Kusserow, Gil Stephenson of Army. Ends—Art Weiner, North Carolina; Jim Martin, Notre Dame. Tackles—Al Wistert, Michigan; Bert Aton, Army. Guards—Buddy Burris, Oklahoma; Marty Wendell, Notre

Dame. Center—Alex Sarkisian, Northwestern.

Justice was terrific last Saturday, as he had been 11 Saturdays before and most of the distance between. He scored twice, pitched two touchdowns passes and set up a fifth score as the Tar Heels walked Virginia, 34 to 12.

He led the week's best backfield including Tripucka, who completed three passes, all four touchdowns, against Washington; Ed Finn of Brown, who flipped three scoring passes against Colgate on Thanksgiving Day, and Bill Hawkins of Navy, who scored two of Navy's three touchdowns in the ranking 21 to 21 tie with Army.

Other backfield stars of the final big week were Lindy Berry of Texas Christian, who lugged the ball 177 yards in a 7 to 7 tie with Southern Methodist; Gil Johnson of S. M. U. whose personal heroics in the dying minutes enabled his team to gain that tie; Jimmy Devenshire of West Virginia, whose two touchdowns helped lick Maryland, 16 to 14; Ed Salem of Alabama, who scored twice and provided the winning margin over Florida (34 to 28) with a 32-yard gallop at the finish; Ray Matthews of Clemson, who led a late scoring surge that beat Auburn, 7 to 6.

Larry Cooney of Penn State with a touchdown that counted and one that didn't in a 7 to 0 triumph over Washington State; Rauch, whose passing set up Georgia Tech's two touchdowns against Georgia Tech; Bus Entsminger of Missouri, who scored twice and set up a third for a 21 to 7 victory over Kansas last Thursday, and Bobby Thomson of V. M. I. who figured in three tallies against Virginia Tech.

Charles Burton, former sports editor and now special writer for the Dallas Times, arrived in Eugene late Sunday night and will remain here for the next ten days or two weeks to write special stories for his paper on the Oregon football team. Oregon plays SMU in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas New Year's Day.
