

### Two Hit-and-Runs Reported to Police

Two hit-and-run accidents were reported to city police over the weekend. At 10:30 p.m. Saturday an unidentified car struck a coach belonging to the Engle and Worth Lumber Co. of McMinnville while it was parked near Sixth and Charnelton. Damage to the Mc-

PORTLAND —(AP)— While the national average declined, Portland food prices increased .3 percent in December, the regional Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Monday. Meat, eggs, fats, oils and beverages dropped slightly, but other food prices went up, the bureau said. The national index was down 1.2 per cent from November.

### Two Net \$70,000 In Bank Holdup

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. —(AP)— Bandits held up the Mercantile Bank on fashionable Lincoln Road Monday and escaped with \$70,000.

Miami Beach police said two thieves were waiting in the night depository room inside the bank when two clerks entered to remove the deposits to the bank vaults.

They seized all deposits placed in the depository over the weekend and fled in an automobile waiting outside the office building where the bank is located.

S. W. Curry, bank cashier, estimated the theft at from \$60,000 to \$70,000 on the basis of deposits placed in the night box during the previous weekend.

Police said the bandits apparently gained entry into the depository chamber Friday night by posing as workmen employed on a repair job in a theater which is in the bank building.

They entered a broom and mop locker off the theater lobby, broke a hole through the wall leading to a recess under the building's escalator which was part of the night depository chamber.

When clerks E. Jeter and J. W. Dameron entered the chamber at 8:15 a.m., the bandits held them up and forced them to turn over the deposits. The bandits then gagged the two clerks and secured them with handcuffs. They were dumped into the recess under the escalator and the bandits made their escape through the hole they had made Friday night.

### Council to Hear Results Of City Manager Study

A three-man committee of councilmen will meet Monday night to discuss applications for the city manager's position that Deane Seeger soon will leave to become a municipal consultant for the League of Oregon Cities. Thirty-two applications have been received since Seeger announced his intentions of leaving the office. Councilmen C. C. Crumbaker, W. L. Davis and A. L. Hawn have reviewed the applications individually and Monday night will begin the process of making a final selection. They will report their findings later to the council as a whole, which under the city charter holds the power to hire and dismiss the city manager.

### Two Stores Ransacked At Four Corners

Two businesses at Four Corners on Roosevelt Blvd. were broken into and entered sometime Saturday night, state police reported Monday. Officers are investigating. About \$45 in small change and several miscellaneous items were taken from Dickson's Eight Ball Market, and a rifle was taken from Bucklin's Feed Store nearby. Police said the two establishments had been ransacked, with contents of desk drawers and other items scattered about.

### Pretty Dates Found Costly

RENO, Nev. —(AP)— Salvador Maruriquez, 35-year-old Sacramento, Calif., music store owner, faced possible amputation of both feet Saturday after three attractive young women robbed him of \$600 gambling winnings, beat him and threw him out of their car into the snow.

Maruriquez was found shortly after 6 a.m. wandering barefooted in the snow in the desert north of Reno by sheriff's deputies investigating a report that a man's shoes, hat and coat were found lying on the highway.

The Sacramento man was found dazed, covered with blood and suffering from severe frostbite.

He told police later in the day that three young women, whom he described as "very pretty," offered to take him to see a "good Latin floor show" after he won \$600 gambling.

Instead, Maruriquez told police, the women beat him with a piece of pipe, robbed him of the \$600, removed his shoes, hat and coat and tossed him out into the snow.

### Crews Search for Plane Reported Down in Flames

PORTLAND —(AP)— Searchers hoped for clearing weather Monday to investigate a report of a plane crash about 20 miles northwest of here.

Snow, sleet and fog confined searchers to a limited area along a road in the area Sunday.

A ranch foreman reported Saturday night that he saw the plane break into flames and fall Thursday.

No planes are listed as missing in this area, but one piloted by John L. Krause Jr., Antioch, Calif., disappeared in northern California or southern Oregon Thursday. Krause was on a flight from Redding Calif., to Medford.

### Man Arrested In 'Crime' Shop

PORTLAND —(AP)— Portland police Monday said they arrested Albert Domeniconi, 63, in his "hobby" crime workshop.

Detectives explained they found a library of books on how to pick locks in Domeniconi's home-workshop along with plaster of paris molds of cops' badges, some card marking devices, loaded dice and a safe dial rigged up for "training and practice."

Police quoted him as saying he made specialized burglary tools for "clients," either for sale or loan with a percentage of the haul. His bail was set at \$3000. He was charged with possessing fire arms and burglary tools.

### Writer Accused Of Shooting Priest

NEW YORK —(AP)— Elmer Stanford, 40, an unemployed writer, was accused by police Monday of wounding a Catholic priest in a confession last Saturday because "he had a grudge against priests for not giving him money."

Stanford, described as a religious fanatic, was captured Sunday after an hour-long gun battle in which he held off 100 police with a .22 rifle fired through the barricaded door of his boarding house room.

Police wounded Stanford in the neck and stomach before he surrendered. He was taken to a hospital where attendants reported his wounds were not serious. One policeman was wounded in the finger.

Stanford, according to police, shot the Rev. Vincent J. Campbell in the left leg while attending confession Saturday afternoon in the Roman Catholic Church of St. John the Martyr.

Although he refused to admit shooting the priest, several witnesses identified him. Neighbors told detectives he was a religious fanatic and carried a grudge against priests for refusing him money.

### A-Weapon; What Is It?

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Here is the Atomic Energy Commission's answer to "what is an atomic weapon."

"The fundamental ingredients of atomic weapons are the fissionable materials uranium 235 and plutonium. These are heavy metals, which are similar in appearance to ordinary metals. They are non-explosive in small quantities."

"But an explosion can be produced by bringing sufficiently large masses of fissionable material together rapidly. An atomic weapon is a device for doing this."

"There are limitations on the size and weight of an atomic weapon if it is to be carried in an airplane and dropped on a target. It must be capable of being produced in quantity. It must be reliable in performance."

The commission won't even hint as to how many atomic weapons, or bombs, it possesses. But it will tell you that as of now:

"A total of eight atomic weapons have been detonated: in the test at Alamogordo (N.M.) in 1945; at Nagasaki in August, 1945; two tests at Bikini in July and in the three tests at Eniwetok in April and May, 1948."
