High point of the evening for Eugene scouts and their friends was presentation of the Silver Beaver award to Dr. E. D. Furrer, council vice-president and former scoutmaster and squadron leader in Eugene. Austin Dadds made the presentation on behalf of the National Council of Boy Scouts of America.
