legislature. He stressed the fact that only two changes of a qualitative nature were included in the request made to the budget committee. Forty-two additional teachers are requested for the seven institutions and a 10 per cent increase in salary funds is being asked to place the system in better competition with neighboring states.

But, the president said, the actual increase in state funds necessary to give the state system the operating budget necessary is close to 65 per cent. He gave as one reason for this the slackening off during the coming biennium of enrollment of veterans, for which the institutions get a federal subsidy.

If the people of this state believe that you can't put too much energy, thought, and revenue into the development of the young people of the state, then it will be their concern to see that the young people who go out from

our institutions are better prepared to face and handle the problems of a mean and troubled world, Dr. Newburn declared.

Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, Silverton, chairman of the building committee of the State Board of Higher Education, outlined for the visiting Dads the cost of building needs of schools of the state system. The state budget director, he said, has cut the building budget from the state system budget request.

"I think, however," he said, "that we will get some building funds."

The new winds which hurled the Rockies were part of the storm which whistled in on the West Coast Friday, blowing a blizzard into Donner Pass in the California Sierras and blocking US Highway 40.

Motorists Stranded
An estimated several thousand motorists and winter sports fans were stranded on the highway, but snowplows finally cleared the road after 12 hours work.

The bodies of three railroad workmen were recovered Saturday from beneath tons of snow and debris that swept down a steep Utah mountainside Friday night. The avalanche buried the Union Pacific's north-south mainline between Pocatello, Idaho, and Salt Lake City, halting traffic for several hours.

Warmer in South
Elsewhere in the mid-continent, there was light snow in Montana, Iowa, and Minnesota, and temperatures rose slowly over Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma. It was warming along the Gulf Coast, too, with mercury ranging

during the day from the low 50s in Louisiana to 65 at Jacksonville, Fla.

Southern California remained cooler than normal and there was some cloudiness there. Los Angeles had an afternoon reading of 54. In the far northwest, some snow continued up the Puget Sound area where Seattle had flurries.
