Non-Communist World Raps Cardinal's Fate

LONDON.—(P)—Leaders throughout the non-Communist world bitterly denounced the life imprisonment sentence imposed upon Josef Cardinal Mindszenty Tuesday by a people's court of Communist-dominated Hungary.

Comment ranged from "a savage Communist attack on the Christian church" to a "travesty of justice."

In many countries, bishops called on Catholics for special prayers. Pope Pius XII knelt in prayer in his private chapel at the Vatican City, Vatican sources said, after hearing the news "with most profound sorrow."

The pope will take the first occasion to protest "in most definitive terms," Vatican informants reported.

In Germany, the Archbishop of Trier, Dr. Friedrich Rudolf Bornemann, and the archbishop of Paderborn, Laurentius Jaeger, called for special prayers.

"Living Campaign"

"This trial is nothing but a part of a mean Communist living campaign against the Catholic Church," Archbishop Bornemann said in a pastoral letter.

In Austria, Andreu Rohrbacher, archbishop of Salzburg, said the sentence "is just what we expected, we will not give the Hungarian government the honor of our protest."

The Roman Catholic archbishop of Liverpool, the Most Rev. Richard Downey, said "the travesty of justice has been played out to the end. One thing is certain: the cardinal will never be allowed his liberty to tell what happened to him during the five weeks of his imprisonment before so-called trial."

Belgian Speaks

The life sentence was "nothing less than a delayed death sentence," commented Frans Van Cauwelaert, president of the Belgian Chamber of Deputies.

In the French National Assembly, Deputy Marc Scherer resigned from the Franco-Hungarian Assn., a group of deputies interested in Hungarian affairs.

In London, L. W. B. Teeling, conservative member of Parliament, served notice that he will ask cabinet member Harold Wilson, president of the Board of Trade, to consider breaking off negotiations for a trade treaty with Hungary.

Said Moscow-Directed

Exiled Hungarian politicians said the trial and sentence were Moscow-directed.

"The verdict against the last fighter for freedom in Hungary was laid down in Moscow a long time ago," said the former Hungarian foreign minister under Regent Adm. Horthy, Gustav Hennyey. He is chairman of the Hungarian Refugee Committee in Munich.

Tacoma Loan Head Speaks To Club on Business Outlook

A survey of the business outlook for 1949 was given members of Kiwanis Club Monday noon by Gerrit Vander Ende, president of Pacific First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. of Tacoma, Wash., who told Kiwanians that with the current large money circulation and large national debt the nation is going into an economy based on the reduced dollar value.

The national debt, now amounting to \$250,000,000,000 came about first through deficit financing and then through the recent war. President Vander Ende pointed out. The interest charge on this amount comes to \$5,000,000,000 but he believes the nation can carry the debt.

"A billion dollars in one dollar bills piled on top of the other would make a stack seven and a half miles high," the speaker declared. "We have 250 of those piles, plus five piles each year for carrying charges."

Today the nation has a depreciated dollar, Vander Ende emphasized. The 1940 dollar, worth 70 to 80 cents in the 1930's, is worth just 42 cents today. This is due to enormous circulation of more than four times the circulation in 1940. It means that the nation has four times as much money as commodities, with prices going up and the purchasing power of the dollar going down.

"People don't like to feel prices going down," the speaker declared. "The business of the recent years has been based on pent-up demand plus government spending. Now we are gradually catching up, but I don't believe we will go down hill. We will go into an economy based on reduced dollar value."

The Pacific coast has had a population increase of more than 40 per cent since the war, and population makes business. The people will stay on the coast if they can find employment, the financier believes, any money will come if employment can be found for them.

This year should bring a continued flow of business at a somewhat lower level, depending on government actions, President Vander Ende believes.

The speaker warned that there is no free money from the government, and urged his audience to remember that it all comes from taxation. Government subsidies mean more money from taxpayers to be allocated, and government subsidies to farmers mean a rise in the cost of living for the city dweller. Under the Marshall Plan the government is exporting products worth millions, but this export must be balanced by imports in a like amount, he believes.

Touching on housing, Vander Ende said he thought the issue had become a political football, and was being discussed on an emotional basis. He agreed that there is a place for slum clearance and public housing, but urged that the need be decided on a local basis instead of in Washington.

Vander Ende cautioned that the nation needs clear thinking to maintain the status quo and to save it from more socialism than it is already experiencing. He warned against deficit financing and asking the government for too much.

"There is nothing the country can't carry, but we must watch our step and not ask the government to do everything for us," the speaker warned. "We must stand on our own feet and keep our money sound if we are to better the outlook."
