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Four-Way Tie in Texas Open

Palmer Blows Chance for Lead

Snead, Metz, Douglas
Included in Deadlock

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Feb. 12 (AP)—A final hole blowup by Johnny Palmer of Badin, N.C., resulted in a four-way tie for leadership in the \$10,000 Texas Open golf tournament at the three-quarter mark of 54 holes.

When Palmer, the pacemaker, missed his chance to retain sole leadership by firing a bogie four on the last hole, Sammy Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Dave Douglas of Wilmington, Del., and Dick Metz of Virginia Beach, Va., were tied at 203, a total of 10 strokes under par.

Many Break Par

The quarter's three-quarter mark totals in this 22nd annual Texas Open were two strokes up on the field, but 30 pros and amateurs bettered par despite a steady morning-long drizzle on Brackenridge Park.

Snead, Douglas and Metz, who had held the lead until Palmer came in with the last three-hole, were playing in the same group. Ferrier Shoots 65.

Snead and Douglas blasted out five-under-par 66's while Metz slipped to a 69 after previous rounds of 66 and 68.

The stage was set for a possible tie at the end of Sunday's round. If one comes, it will be the third of the young winter tour.

Two strokes back of the leaders were Jim Turnesa and Jim Ferrier. Turnesa, of Briarcliff, N.Y., had a 34-34-68 while the veteran Ferrier, playing out of San Francisco, gave Brackenridge 6,400 yard layout the best blistering of the day—a six-under par 65.

Davey Ball, 154-pound slugger from Bakersfield, Cal., and Al Cliff, classy 156-pound youngster from Portland, have been signed for the special four-rounder on Wednesday's Oregon lightweight championship brawl at the Eugene Armory.

Matchmaker Elton Owen

Matchmaker Elton Owen announced that two other four-rounders will be signed early in the week to assure local fight fans of one of the best fight cards to be staged here in many years. All of the preliminaries will involve "willing club fighters," as Owen puts it.

Joey Ortega, Tacoma, Wash., battler, will defend his Oregon lightweight title in the 10-round feature against Jimmy Gooding, popular Portlander who won his Oregon featherweight title in a thrilling slugfest here several months ago—a decision over faster stepping Bobby Richards of California.

The Irish-Mexican, who has beaten such men as Freddie Steele and Joey Clemo, has agreed to make 130 pounds for his title defense—five pounds lighter than better match Gooding's 125 pounds.

Both boys have been in intensive training for more than a week in preparation for the title tilt which promises to draw the biggest local crowd since Jack Dempsey packed the Armory more than ten years ago.

The six-round semi-final

will send Eddie Johan of Klamath Falls against Ralph Ayers of Portland. Both are fast and willing middleweights.

Other clubs entered include Westport of Coburg, Siuslaw of Florence, Springfield, Cottage Grove, and Marcola. All clubs are expected to hold shoots, starting at 10 a.m.

There is no limit to the number of accredited shooters from each club and the best 25-bird scores are used to make up the three-man teams. The first 25 targets shot, however, must count in the telegraphic competition.

Coach John Warren's Webfoots have already suffered straight defeats to the University of Wyoming and Long Island University in McArthur Court, and Coach Pete Newell's Dons will come here with a great record. Among their 18 victories to date (not counting games this weekend), are CCNY, Bradley Tech, North Carolina, LaSalle, Nevada and Arizona.

Little West Virginia Star Paces Scorers

NEW YORK, Feb. 12 (AP)—George King, Morris Harvey's scoring wizard, held his individual basketball scoring leadership among the nation's smaller colleges with a 28.5 average.

The West Virginia junior scored 42 points against Fairmont State in one game to rocket his 15 game total to 427 points on 164 field goals and 99 fouls.

Evan Zlock, of Susquehanna, Pa., retained his second place position with a 26.2 average in nine games. John Wilson of Anderson, Ind., held onto his No. 3 ranking with 25.5 for 15 contests.

Oregon's varsity swimming team, an easy victor over OSC, but beaten by Washington in the Webfoots' last outing, will meet Idaho here Friday and Washington State Saturday in dual meets. The WSC meet is expected to decide the final second place in the Northern Division dual meet standings. Both meets will be afternoon affairs.

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
