

River to Flood Saturday Noon At 13-14.5 Feet

Transportation Normal

Most transportation systems were normal Friday morning. Southern Pacific said its railroad was "allright." Greyhound buses were running on schedule except for some rerouting while the Willamette Highway was closed, and City Transit Lines said all local buses were running.

Junction City and Cottage Grove both reported a large amount of surface water in the

cities, but Eugene could match anything these communities had to offer.

Amazon Holds Water

Eugene city maintenance men said the large amount of run-off was caused by the thaw and already-saturated earth. The Amazon drainage ditch, the department reported, was running full but still in its banks Friday morning. Nineteenth Ave. E. between Willamette and Alder Sts. was almost impassable Friday morning. Other low areas reported suffering from the heavy downpour were the Amazon area east of South Willamette St., the Cheshire St. district, and southwest Eugene where mud was causing autos to bog down.

Basements Flooded

The city street department said it had received "many calls," and expected to receive "a great many more" in the next day or so. Many residents reported flooded basements, and some business houses said water was coming into basements where merchandise was stored.

The local weather bureau said Friday that colder temperatures expected Thursday night did not come because the storm front moved through to one side of the area, with rain before it and after it.

The storm front was moving extremely slowly, and another storm was reported forming behind this one. Temperatures in Eugene at 8 a.m. were 42 degrees, and freezing level in the mountains at that time was about 6000 feet.

Total rain for February recorded in Eugene up to 7 a.m. Thursday was 7.74, with about half of that falling in the preceding 48 hours. Normal for the month is 4.61 inches.

Red Cross Working

The Lane County Red Cross, which started its disaster organization working early Friday, said workers had been called out in the middle of the night to rescue a family near Noti. Vincent Kemp, resident Army Engineer took a boat from Fern Ridge Dam to bring Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Young out of a danger area near Noti. The couple lived on a small island about three and a half miles from Elmira School.

Hugh McCallum, chapter chairman, said Mayor Ed Johnson, Eugene, has been "most cooperative" in helping plan evacuation and housing for about 100 residents of the Ferry St. Bridge Settlement.

Safe Bike Plan Ready Saturday

Hey, kids, Saturday is L-Day in Eugene. Beginning at 9 a.m., you can take your quarter to the fire station at 11th Ave. and Willamette St., and get your license, the plate, have the license number stamped into the frame, and have Scotchlite tape striped on your bike's frame.

You must get your license and have the number put in your bike's frame. And Police Chief Keith Jones asks that every one of you get that luminous tape put on your bikes. Only the licenses must be purchased; the tape is free.

The chief explains that kids and adults on bicycles are hard to see in the dark. When a motorist rounds a corner he often doesn't see a bike until it's too late. And when the bike rider zips out of a driveway, he's going too fast to see.

A lot of bike-riders have gone to the hospital with broken bones and internal injuries. Some have died.

So this scheme of taping bikes with Scotchlite makes sense. The bike with the tape can be seen for half a block. It should cut down the accidents quite a bit.

It's free, and actually makes the bike look better. The plan is to put the tape on in such a manner that the bike frame is outlined.

So when you go down to fire station Saturday, you'll find a policeman, a fireman, and some members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce waiting for you. The policeman will give you the license plate, the fireman will stamp the number on the frame, and the Jaycee will help firemen put on the luminous tape.

License is Permanent. One more thing. The license you get this year is permanent. It will stay with the bike for several years. When you sell your bike, take the bill of sale to the police station and let them know about it. Then the license goes to the new owner.

Also the number stamping on the frame will make it easier for the police to find your bike if it's lost or stolen. The letters for the Eugene Police Department will also be stamped so that the public will know it's a Eugene bike.

And that's the deal. Saturday at 9 a.m. The policemen, firemen, and the Jaycees are waiting to help you.

Bill Would Hit Late Tax Filing

SALEM — (U.P.) — The House passed 39 to 21 a bill to penalize persons who file late or incomplete personal property tax returns.

The measure provides for a five per cent penalty tax. Proponents said this was patterned after the state and federal income tax laws which use penalty taxes to aid in collection.

Opposition was expressed by Reps. Earl E. Fisher, Beaverton, and Joseph E. Harvey, Portland, both Republicans, who thought it "was making the taxpayer, instead of the assessor, do all the work."

Rep. Robert C. Gile, (R-Roseburg), said that was exactly the purpose: "to make it a little tougher for the taxpayer who would avoid the law."

Other Crests. Expected flood stages and crest times at other points are: Harrisburg, 17.5 feet Saturday night; Coburg Bridge, 14.5 feet Saturday forenoon; Corvallis, 26 feet Sunday noon; Albany, 26 feet Sunday afternoon; Salem, 25 feet Monday morning.

Weathermen warned that the flood situation could easily change for better or worse. More storms moving quickly into the area might bring more than the expected amount of rain, or might bring the river up again from the Saturday crest after it has begun to fall.

However, colder temperatures and slackened rainfall may result in a lower reading than that expected.

The Oregon State Liquor Control Commission temporarily suspended several Lane County licenses at the regular meeting Feb. 8.

The alcoholic beverage license of Thomas A. and Rose E. Ward was suspended for a period of 10 days, effective Feb. 16. They are in business as the Knox Station at 2288 Whittaker St., Cottage Grove. The suspension was ordered af-

ter evidence was introduced to the commission at a public hearing which showed the sale of alcoholic beverages to a minor.

The commission also ordered the service permit of Kenneth W. Knutsen, employed at the Oasis Tavern, Eugene, be suspended for 10 days. The suspension was effective Feb. 16. During the period of suspension Knutsen is restrained from selling, serving or mixing alcoholic beverages in Oregon.
