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CARE Lowers Lard Prices

Due to a general decrease in food prices, CARE this week announced a reduction of 75 cents in the price of its lard package for Europe.
Effective Monday the 10-pound lard package will be delivered abroad for \$4.75 instead of the earlier quoted price of \$5.50.
Director Paul Comly French said a subsidy for the Economic Cooperation Administration is another factor in the price reduction.
"The CARE lard package, containing 10 pounds of Swift's, meets the number one food need in Europe today," said French. "I sincerely hope our lowered price will encourage Americans to send more and more such packages now."
Swift's is a special product, especially suitable for long distance shipment and storage. It is a bland lard, which will not turn rancid and requires no refrigeration.

President's Critics Say Keep Hands Off Nation's Business

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman's confident forecast of continued prosperity brought this reaction Friday from his Capitol Hill critics: The best way to help the nation's business is to leave it alone.
The President also renewed his request Thursday for a \$4,000,000,000 tax boost—a proposal which appeared to be picking up support from Democrats, but only if necessary to keep the treasury out of the red. There is a lot of opposition, however.
President Confident
Mr. Truman told his Thursday news conference current price drops are only the leveling-off that everybody has been hoping for, and he spoke confidently of the business outlook. He said the business situation is nothing to be alarmed about.
Some critics agreed that the leveling off is healthy. But they said the President's economic control program, if approved by Congress, might turn a healthy recession into a depression.
While Mr. Truman took the economic temperature, there were these other developments:
Buying Sharpens
1. Buying interest in the New York stock market sharpened Thursday and the market moved ahead for the best overall advance in six weeks.
2. At Cleveland, the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad announced temporary layoffs for more than 4000 employees in four areas. A spokesman blamed declining passenger business and slower movement of coal due to a mild winter.
3. The Baltimore & Ohio Railroad ordered a five-day furlough late this month for 2521 of its shop employees.
4. At Detroit, the Kaiser-Frazer Automobile Co. announced it will close its Willow Run plant, where 7000 work, for three weeks while plans are made for production of two new utility model cars.
5. The United States Chamber of Commerce advised employers to resist fourth-round wage hikes lest they reverse the downward trend in the cost of living.
6. A majority of the 17 private-industry economists attending a Capitol Hill conference spoke out against the administration's request for higher taxes and wage-price allocation controls. They contended such action now would hamper business expansion.

Rev. Edward L. Shafer

The Rev. Edward L. Shafer, 81, of Springfield, died Thursday, Feb. 17, 1949. He was born Nov. 25, 1867, in Shelby, Indiana. He married Cora Boles June 4, 1895, in Wichita, Kansas, and they moved to Eugene in 1914.
The Rev. Shafer had been an officer in the Salvation Army for many years, was an ordained minister of the Open Bible Stand and was a member of the Lighthouse Temple.
Besides his widow, he is survived by four children: Mrs. Marie Ragner, of Salem; Guy Shafer, of Marcola; Rev. George Shafer, of Columbia, South Carolina; and Mrs. Vera Hansen, of Springfield; 14 grandchildren, and 4 great-grandchildren.

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Springfield Chamber Opposes CVA Bill

SPRINGFIELD—The Chamber of Commerce Wednesday went on record as opposing the principle of an agency controlling development of the Columbia River.
Marvin O. Sanders, Chamber president, said the board of directors took this stand during a regular business meeting Wednesday noon. He said the matter would be referred to the Public Affairs Committee for further study when additional CVA information had been secured.
He added the Chamber was waiting until an actual text of the bill concerning provisions of CVA had been introduced into Congress before taking any definite action.
Sanders also explained that forthcoming replies to questionnaires sent last week to Chambers in the immediate vicinity of the TVA project would have a bearing on the chamber's attitude toward a CVA for the Northwest.

County 'Dimes' Totals \$13,950.41 on Friday

With money still coming in, and much of the county collection still unreported, the March of Dimes collection in Eugene stood at \$13,950.41 Friday morning.
Oakridge reported that it will go more than 100 per cent over the 1948 total. The amount will be released when volunteers complete counting the money.

CVA Advocates To Map Action

Advocates of a Columbia Valley Authority will meet in the Portland Grange Hall at 2 p.m. Saturday to plan active support of CVA. The meeting will be open to the public, the League for CVA announced.
The leaders of 10 Pacific Northwest farmer-labor organizations and many public power supporters will attend the regional convocation. The groups attending include the Oregon and Washington granges, the Washington, Oregon and Idaho Federations of Labor, the Oregon and Washington CIO, and the Oregon, Idaho and Montana farmers' unions—all are affiliated with the CVA League.
Oregon Grangemaster Morton Thompson will preside over the meeting, which will consider an educational and research program designed to acquaint Northwest residents with CVA. New officers will be elected, said Thompson, who is an executive board member.
Rep. Hugh B. Mitchell, (D-Wash.), president of the CVA League will fly from Washington, D. C., to address the meeting. Mitchell, who introduced the original CVA bill in 1945 as a U. S. senator, said he had invited Charles S. Murphy, President Truman's administrative assistant, and Assistant Secretary of Interior Girard Davidson to attend the meeting.

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
