Detroit Dam Is Important To Valley Power Grid

The construction of Detroit Dam, which will follow opening of bids in Portland Thursday, is of key importance to the entire Willamette Valley power supply, William E. Trommershausen, district manager of the Bonneville Power Administration, said Monday.

Power installation schedules have been moved up one year from the original "Schedule R," which is a coordinated timetable agreed upon by the Bureau of Reclamation, the Army Engineers and the Bonneville Power Administration.

Two Detroit generators are on the schedule. Unit No. 1 should be completed by December of 1952 and will carry 50,000 kilowatts. Unit No. 2 should be completed by December of 1953 and bring the total capacity to 100,000 kilowatts.

The Detroit installation, upon completion, will directly reinforce the entire Willamette Valley power grid system, according to Trommershausen.

Upon completion of the Golden Dale-Detroit-Goshen 230 kilovolt transmission line, the new dam will bolster that major transmission facility, also the manager stated.

Bids Called On Substation

Bids have been called by the postmaster on a new substation to be located within a three-block radius of Thirteenth Ave. and Willamette St.

Bids will be accepted in the office of the postmaster until Feb. 28.

The expansion program of the postoffice calls for this station to add to the service of five substations already established. Later, when the new Student Union Building is completed on the campus, the postoffice hopes to establish a regular contract station in that building which will include all postal services, not just the limited services of substations.
