

Mt. States Ties In for Power

SPRINGFIELD — Mountain States Power Co. this week made arrangements with the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. to purchase 500 kilowatts of electrical energy on a temporary basis.

The temporary tie-in will be in effect until July 1 when the lumber company's pulp mill begins operation. The Weyerhaeuser 7500 kilowatt generator has been operating for two weeks on a test run basis, delivering 3000 KW's to the Mountain States system during the day and 800 KW's at night. The initial tie-in was made Feb. 2.

A second steam plant generator with a capacity of 500 KW's will be installed in the spring to bring the total electrical capacity of the Weyerhaeuser steam plant to 13,500 kilowatts.

Broad Studies Urged in Talk

Dr. Kline Swygard, associate professor of political science at Oregon State College, told 175 high school students and their faculty advisers this morning in the opening speech of the International Relations conference that "We must know the unvarnished truth about the world today."

The speaker emphasized that a broad education is essential in appreciating the world situation. Suggests Reading

He recommended studies ranging from politics and history to psychology and geography to understand the people of today and the causes of various institutions. Knowledge of the Hague conferences of 1899 and 1907 and the League of Nations of 1919 is necessary to understand why those organizations did not prevent war, he observed.

Dr. Gordon Wright, associate professor of history at the University of Oregon, will address the delegates at a banquet at the Osborn Hotel Friday at 6:30 on "International Affairs: Illusion and Reality."

Six Questions
Conference plans include discussion of six specific questions in three sessions during the two days by all members of the roundtables. The questions are all concerned with the general topic: "Can the United Nations Do the Job?"

Four foreign students, now attending the University of Oregon, will participate in a panel discussion Saturday morning. The students are Leslie John Martin, Great Britain; Ching Hou, China; Nevelle Hilton Clarke, Tabago, B.W.I.; Christiane Beyler, France. Schleicher Presides

Dr. Charles P. Schleicher, professor of political science at the university, and executive secretary of the Oregon Education Ass'n's international relations committee, will preside at the discussion.

The conference is sponsored jointly by the OEA and the university. Assisting groups are the Oregon League of Women Voters, American Association of University Women, University of Oregon International Relations Club, University dormitories, Interfraternity council, Heads of Women's houses, and Skull and Dagger, all of the University of Oregon.

UN Views Truman's 'Bold Plan'

Thorp Outlines Policy Before Economic Group

LAKE SUCCESS—(AP)—The United States laid before the United Nations Friday the broad outlines of President Truman's "bold new program" for long-range betterment of underprivileged areas the world over.

The first major policy statement here on the fourth point in Mr. Truman's inaugural address was given to the 18-nation Economic and Social Council by Assistant Secretary of State Willard L. Thorp.

There was no mention of how much money the United States might put up or how private capital would participate as proposed by Mr. Truman, but Thorp told the council:

"In order to safeguard the cooperative nature of the enterprise and the international character of the organization sponsoring it, no one country should be expected to assume all or most of the financial burden of the expanded program."

Costs Agreed
In this connection observers recalled that the United States has contended it should pay no more than one-third of the annual UN budget but has agreed reluctantly to carry nearly 40 per cent of the costs. Thorp suggested many countries might contribute goods, services and local currencies in lieu of hard money.

Thorp urged the council to take up a three-point program he said the United States would offer as a resolution. It proposes that:

1. The UN and its specialized agencies prepare a coordinated "concrete program" for consideration by the council at its summer session in Geneva.

Arrange Expansion
2. "The report covers ways and means for arranging for financial expansion" to support projects undertaken on recommendation of the UN agencies.

3. The report includes recommendations for cooperation of planning, execution and control.

"The timetable for attainment of these objectives of economic development is measured in decades, not in years," Thorp told the council. "The reorientation of the way of life of millions of people can come only gradually. However, with a bold new program of technical cooperation the United Nations can hasten significantly economic development."

Wallgren Says Red 'Danger' In Appointment

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Former Gov. Mon Wallgren of Washington conceded Friday there had been "danger" in one of his appointments to the State Social Security Committee.

The concession was made while Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) was questioning Wallgren before the Senate Armed Services Committee. The committee is considering Wallgren's nomination to be chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

The appointment referred to was that of John Caughlan, whom Wallgren while governor named to the State Social Security Committee.

Earlier testimony before the committee showed that Caughlan had been identified as a Communist by 11 witnesses before the Washington State Un-American Activities Committee.

Shortly after the Exchange the Senate committee closed its hearing, but gave Senator Cain (R-Wash.) permission to file a summation of his arguments against Wallgren's nomination. Cain has said Wallgren is unfit for the defense post.

Wallgren had testified that the social security committee was a "forgotten agency" and that it had never met officially.

But Cain brought out Friday that Caughlan had testified before a House Ways and Means Committee here in 1946. He said Caughlan identified himself as an official representative of Washington state.

Wallgren said he did not authorize Caughlan to make the trip, and it was made without his knowledge. He said Caughlan had asked his permission and he had denied it. Then, he continued, Caughlan apparently went to the State Social Security Department "and he apparently talked them in to letting him appear for them."

"Doesn't it rather underline the danger of a governor like you of a great state giving certificate of appointment to a man so he could pose as a representative of a social security board?" Knowland asked.

"Wouldn't the House reasonably feel he was representing you...? Isn't that the danger of making appointments of this kind?"

Wallgren replied: "Yes, you're right about that."

Anna Strong Apologizes

NEW YORK—(AP)—Anna Louise Strong, pro-Communist American writer who was expelled from Russia as a spy, said Friday that she now realizes she was "doing a damn good job of getting on the toes of a number of officials" in the Soviet Union.

Mrs. Strong said she did not know the specific reason for her expulsion from Russia, but she had "seen the word 'espionage' was involved in the government's statement."

The 64-year-old writer talked freely to reporters after she appeared before the federal grand jury which has been investigating Communist espionage in this country. She was in the grand jury room about 45 minutes.

Mrs. Strong said she wanted to thank New York reporters for their "fair treatment of me" and added that she especially wanted to say that "because of the ghastly experience I had at La Guardia Airport when I arrived Thursday."

She said she was sorry for remarks she made at the airport. She said then that her treatment by reporters was worse than she received in the Soviet Union.

Bids Invited to Lease C G Reservoir Land

The Portland district, Corps of Engineers, has invited bids for the leasing of 6.07 acres of land within the Cottage Grove reservoir area in Lane County for agriculture and grazing purposes.

The engineers office has set March 11 at 1 p.m. for the opening of bids. The lease will be for four years, six and one-half months, starting March 16 and ending Sept. 30, 1953.

If the land is used for grazing, the lessee must erect sufficient fencing to restrain livestock, the fencing to remain the property of the lessee.

The land may be inspected daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., except Saturdays and Sunday. Arrangements may be made with the Cottage Grove Dam tender, telephone Cottage Grove 44-J-2.

Labor Nominee Told

WASHINGTON—(P)—Michael J. Galvin of Massachusetts was nominated Friday to be under-secretary of labor.

President Truman advised the Senate of his choice for the post and asked its approval. Galvin is a 41-year-old Boston lawyer with a distinguished war record. He had 280 days of front line service as a lieutenant colonel of tanks under Gen. George S. Patton, Jr. in 1944 and 1945.

Budding Seller Plays the Field

SALT LAKE CITY — (P) — A budding super-salesman in Utah apparently operates on the theory that the more people you contact, the more people you sell.

But the strategy backfired in the state Senate.

Sen. Earl D. Gibson (D-Price) received a postcard with a plea for character references. The card explained the writer had applied for a job as salesman with a San Francisco firm.

"After informing Gibson that the writer came from Price and supported the senator in the election, the card concluded:

"Us Democrats stick together." Gibson didn't recognize the signature so he asked Sen. Mitchell Mellich (R-Moab) if he knew such a person.

Mellich thereupon produced an almost identical card. Only this one said the writer was from Moab and had supported Mellich in the election.

"Us Republicans stick together," it concluded.
