

Millrace Hopes Hinge on Owners

Hopes that water will again flow through a major portion of Eugene's 100-year old millrace depended Monday upon obtaining relatively few easements along the historic channel.

It was reported Monday morning that 26 easements have been granted to date by property owners along the canalbanks.

Only six owners below Franklin Boulevard have signed the easements, a Millrace Restoration spokesman said, but property owners living along the race above Franklin Blvd. in the Garden district are yet unsigned.

The millrace committee is working to meet the March 14 deadline for obtaining easements, set Saturday by the city council in a special meeting to determine what action should be taken regarding the race.

Dr. Milton V. Walker, millrace committee president, announced Monday morning that the special council meeting had been called by the Mayor at Dr. Walker's request to determine whether it would instruct the city attorney to work with the millrace association in obtaining an injunction against the Koke-Chapman company who began last Wednesday to pour tons of dirt into the millrace channel at its intersection with roadway Avenue, East.

Meanwhile, a delegation from the millrace restoration group was reported ready to attend Monday night's city council meeting to express views regarding the millrace.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Mild buying demand was enough to send the stock market up today in the midst of quiet trading.

Gains ranged from fractions to a point or more among the leading issues. The volume of trading was at the rate of 700,000 shares for the entire day.

Stocks and bonds provided leadership. Airlines were somewhat backward, utilities were mixed.

Charles Wright went ahead in a show of activity after directors decided to ask stockholders to approve the purchase of common stock up to \$4,000,000 at the lowest prices offered not to exceed 51 cent a share during 1949.

Paramount held to the higher side most of the day.

Stocks going ahead included U. S. Steel, Chrysler, General Motors, Santa Fe, Southern Smelting, International Paper, Radio, Air Reduction, Standard Oil (N.J.), and Texas Co.
