Grade School His
New Attendance High

SPRINGFIELD — Grade school
attendance, increasing steadily
during the past 10 years, this week
reached an all-time high.

E. H. Silke, superintendent of
schools, Tuesday said 2525 stu-
dents were enrolled in this city's
grade schools. He reported that six
new students enrolled at Bratton
grade school Tuesday morning
and added that class rooms are
now filled to near capacity.

A recent school census taken of
the number of children between
the ages 4-19 inclusive in the
Springfield area revealed that this
city ranks fourth in the state with
5577. In 1930 Springfield only
ranked 34th in Oregon with 829
children listed in this age group.
