In the study hour, Mrs. J. H. Beck discussed the life of Henry James. Born in New York in 1843, he was a member of a closely united family. His father, Henry James, Sr., gave his sons and daughters an unusual education, its general plan stressing sense perception and deflection. He took the family to Europe when Henry, Jr., was but twelve. Here young James had the opportunity to travel extensively for four years; later, during 1868, the son returned to Europe and established residence for most of the remainder of his life.

James wrote many essays, short stories and novels. His book, "Ambassadors" is judged as one of the most skillfully written novels of all time. In his works is found a true record of English society of his time. He chose his characters from among those leisured people of the world for whom life is naturally a work of art, and who are far removed from all the more practical aspects of existence, the speaker said.

James writings are said to have exerted far-reaching influence on later authors, for he was profoundly concerned with the technique of his art and always sensitive as a receiver and transmitter of impressions.
