

New Camera Magnifies A Second 1250 Times

PASADENA — (AP) — Development of a new type of camera that actually enlarges, or blows up, a second of time by 1250 times its former size has been disclosed.

The camera is part of the equipment of a water tunnel in which fluids can be sent at a rate of 100 feet per second.

The camera and the water tunnel work together to give scientists new knowledge in the field of hydraulic equipment from ships' propellers to huge turbines of hydro-electric plants.

The camera can magnify time the way a powerful telescope magnifies tiny bacteria.

The Navy-Caltech announcement said:

"As the high speed water tunnel goes into operation, movie cameras which take 20,000 frames per second go into action. Enlarges a Second

"To view pictures taken in one second requires over 20 minutes. The movie makes one-tenth of a second seem bigger than a minute. It actually blows up a second 1250 times its former size so that scientists can watch and examine

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Accused Girl's Duties Told

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Judith Coplon, trim, dark-eyed government girl charged with stealing her country's secrets, had access to strictly "hush-hush" data on foreign agents, it was revealed Tuesday.

A source close to the Justice Department said Miss Coplon could get two types of information valuable to a foreign power. These were available to her through her work as a political analyst in the foreign agents registration section of the Justice Department.

The statements of registered foreign agents, which are kept in Miss Coplon's section, are available to the public. But other information which could have gone through her hands is of a highly secret nature. It would include:

1. A list of foreign agents under investigation, with indications that might lead to confidential informants for the FBI.

2. Names of agents of friendly governments who, for one reason or another, are excused from the requirement of public registration.

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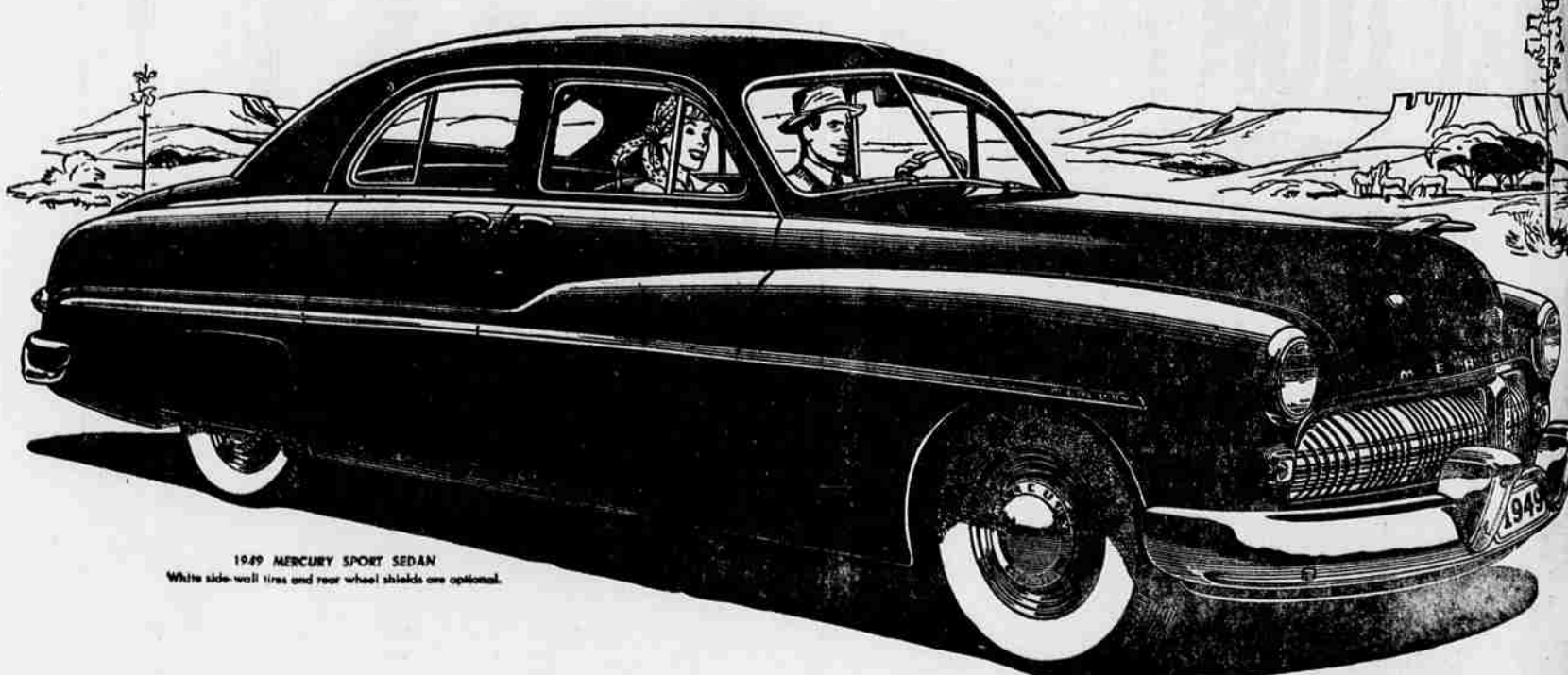
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
