C G Council Eyes Drainage

COTTAGE GROVE — That same old drainage problem bothered the city council at their Monday evening meeting.

In response to drainage complaints which included a letter from A. L. Woodard, of Woodard Lumber Co., the council voted to take a personal tour of the southeast portion of the city Wednesday afternoon.

The street committee recommended to the council that the drainage situation on the east side of town be taken care of by volunteer workers. The city attorney suggested that the workers get easements from property owners in writing. The city engineer is to run levels to assist the volunteers in arranging proper drainage channels.

Street crossing yellow lines are to be painted where needed, and the parking meter posts are to be painted and numbered.

A number of matters were held over, and will be studied further after the return of Mayor Warren Edwards who has been ill.

The Mountain States Power Co. was instructed to install a light on Sixth Street at the alley, west side near the back of the bank building on a telephone pole.

The Oregon State Sanitary Authority has warned the city that it will be necessary for Cottage Grove to show more progress toward completion of the sewerage disposal plant and drainage system before April 8, 1949. A letter is to be written to the Authority inviting a representative, Curtis Everetts, senior engineer, to attend a special council meeting to consider the subject, March 28.

Resolution 398 was passed, vacating a portion of the sewerage unit in the center area of the hospital grounds.

Ordinance 1313 was passed, dealing with the installation, repair, etc., of electrical systems.

The mayor was authorized to sign an application for a two-way radio station license for the city.

Harry Rental was hired to repair parking meters at \$1.75 per hour.

Bills were allowed. Some property received recently from the county will be held for further study before any disposal is made of it.

Floyd Githens was given permission to install metal signs on his used car lot on the rear lot back of his garage.

Captain Bullard of the National Guard spoke to the council with reference to repair of the armory and also means of raising money for the company to build up a miscellaneous expense account. He spoke about appointing a boxing commission so that they could hold boxing and wrestling matches in the future. Motion was made that the council recommend to the mayor to appoint a five-man commission, one member to be a doctor. Motion seconded and carried.
