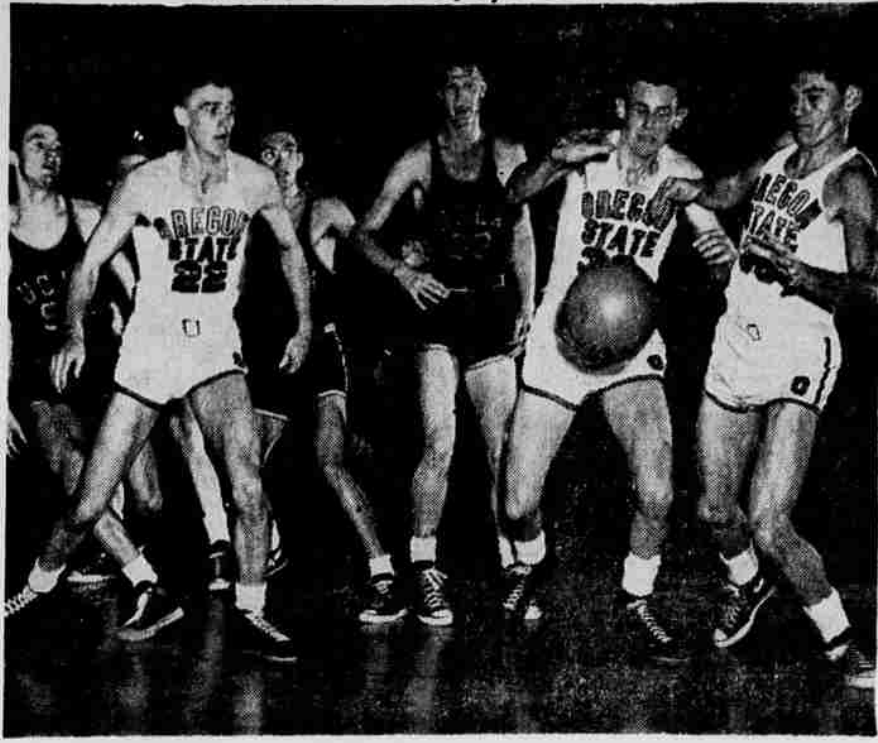

AAU Tourney Opens In Oklahoma Sunday

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 12—(U.P.)—The stage is set, seedings listed and pairings made for the 44th annual AAU basketball tournament, which will give this city a solid week of floor pounding starting Sunday.

Forty-three teams from 23 states, the cream of the nation's amateur hoopers, have entered, each hoping to keep Phillips 66, Bartlesville, Okla., from nailing up its seventh consecutive crown.

Phillips is seeded first in the upper bracket with the Los Angeles Police, Hanes Hosiery Mills (Winston-Salem, N.C.) and Denver Chevrolet. In the lower bracket, the Oakland, Calif., Bitters are seeded in the number two spot, followed by Alpine Dairy of Seattle, Oklahoma City University and the Caterpillar Tractors of Peoria, Ill.

Same Players, Different Caliber Uclans

Oregon State Beaten in Second Playoff Tussle by Bruins 46-39

MEN'S GYM, CORVALLIS, March 12—None of the 3000 spectators packed into this tiniest collegiate gym in the Pacific Coast Conference recognized UCLA's basketball Bruins here Saturday night. The names of the players were the same as those who absorbed a sound 53-41 whipping at the hands of Oregon State's Beavers Friday night. The invaders from Los Angeles wore the same dark blue uniforms, but the caliber of play displayed by the Southern Division champions in scoring a 46-39 victory was in complete reversal.

In forcing the title series into a third game here Monday night, Coach John Wooden apparently remedied all of the weaknesses shown in the initial defeat. The Bruins really gave the Beavers a lesson in the finer points of the game and their performance makes them the favorites to make the jump to the Western Regional NCAA playoffs in Kansas City next weekend.

Cosch Slat Gill failed to pull a Harper, a Holman or a Torrey out of the bag Saturday—and the Oregon State Beavers were beaten by a quintet that out-drove, out-hustled, out-shot and out-smarted them.

Few Good Shots

About the only alibi the Beavers could possibly find was the absence of the big timeclock—which was out of order. But it was probably just as well the Beavers didn't have to know how long they would have to stand out there on their home maple court and absorb their first home conference defeat since Oregon's early-season triumph last year. It was the first UCLA victory in five starts since OSC won the PCC title from the Bruins here in 1947.

Wooden employed the same defense—three front men in a shifting man-for-man and the rear two in a straight man-for-man. The defense functioned so effectively that Oregon State was able to get precious few good shots inside.

Crandall Off

Cliff Crandall, who usually provides a steady scoring punch, was able to hit on only two of 15 attempts from the field—an average of .133, which was even lower than the team mark of .226 for the night. The Bruins, paced by Ralph Joeckel and Carl Kraushaar, managed to hit .390 on their field shooting.

The Orangemen, past-masters at keeping possession of the ball, were also given a stalling lesson in the final four minutes of play when the Bruins controlled the ball for all but a few seconds despite a full-court OSC defense.

Joeckel gave notice of the Bruin threat when he pushed their first fielder through the hemp in five seconds. Ron Pearson, one of the offensive sparkplugs, collected a pair of freethrows and nearly four minutes had elapsed before Dan Torrey connected from the corner. Lead At Half, 24-21.

Chuck Cluska took over for the Bruins at that point and led the invaders to a 13-8 lead in the first eight minutes. Ed Fleming hit a gift and then tipped one in to close the gap to 13-12 with nine minutes remaining. Torrey's shot from the corner later, Kraushaar lead a minute later. Kraushaar hooked one in for a UCLA lead, but Crandall scored his only fielder of the half to put OSC ahead again, 16-15 with seven minutes to go—and that was the last Beaver advantage. Fifteen seconds later Joeckel drove in to score. Alex Petersen's freethrow managed to tie the score at 17-17 with five minutes to go.

Cluska followed one in and hit another from the side for a 21-17 Bruin lead with four minutes to go. But in the last minute Dick Ballantyne hit from close in and added a gift to narrow the margin to 22-21. Freethrows by Paul Saunders and Ray Alba manufactured a 24-21 UCLA lead at halftime.

Change Defenses

The Beavers, who again opened with a man-for-man defense, started the second half with a zone that definitely bothered the Bruins—a defense they solved adequately after Petersen tallied from the field to cut the lead to 25-24 after the first minute. Joeckel and Saunders scored quickly and the Bruin lead varied from three to six points until the final five minutes when the count went up to 44-36.

Oregon State reverted to its man-for-man defense at that point, but the Bruins held the upper hand the rest of the game—although falling to score from the field. The Beavers were no balls of fire with the casaba, either. They didn't hit a single fielder in the final six minutes, after Tommy Holman scored ten seconds after entering the fray.

The only time the Bruins took shots came in the final five seconds when both Joeckel and Alba missed from close in.

Dorena, Springfield Gain Championships

SPRINGFIELD, March 12—Dorena and Springfield are the 1949 grade school champions. Dorena won the 3rd and 4th class title Saturday afternoon by defeating Culp Creek 19-10, while Springfield defended its honors among 1st and 2nd class schools with a hard-earned 26-21 victory over Junction City.

In consolation games, played at the high school, Crow knocked over Disston 27-13 in the smaller-school bracket, while Oakridge whipped Danebo 21-11.

Dorena had no trouble with Culp Creek, leading 8-0 at the end of the first period, and rolling up a 10-4 halftime margin. Moore with eight points led the winners, while Sloan had six of the losers' ten points.
