Kirsch has been working with a 30-man squad that includes 13 lettermen—a strong infield and lots of outfield talent. His infield is rather well set with Dick Bartle at first, Walt Kirsch at second, Al Cohen at short and Don Kimball at third. The outfield lettermen are Johnny Kovenz, Hal Zurcher, Ray Stratton, Pat Wohlers, Don Dibble, Norm Henwood. Pitchers are DeWayne Johnson, Homer Bropt and Dick DeBernardi.

★ The fourth annual Moose state bowling tournament got under way Saturday night when two team flights opened the two weekends of action on the Recreation lanes, with approximately 45 teams scheduled for competition, along with 60 doubles combinations and a host of singles entrants. Next weekend the women Moose will stage their tourney down at U-Bowl, about 16 squads entered from around the state. The Moose men will shift to doubles and singles action Sunday afternoon, with more team, doubles and singles play to continue March 19-20.

The city of Portland will assume the position as the bowling capital of the West during the latter part of April and the first of May, hosting two western tournaments at the same time. Both the Northwest International Bowling Congress Tournament for men and the 17th Northwest Tournament for women will be housed in Portland from April 28 to May 14. These tournaments are really western tournaments, drawing entrants from western states as well as Canada and Alaska.

★ The last time the twin meets were held in Portland, both set an all time high for entry records, but these have since been eclipsed. Seattle setting the current high of 356 teams in 1947. This means that Portland will have to have nearly 2000 keggers ready to do pin busting before the entries close April 1.
