Englishwoman to Present Training in Folk Dances

Miss Janet E. Tobitt of Sussex, England, and New York City, author and well-known authority on music, folk dances and games, will be in Eugene March 31 and April 1 to give two training sessions in folk dancing and music.

Miss Tobitt for some years has been music and folk dance instructor at Girl Scout national training schools and at various university summer schools. She also has acted as consultant to a number of organizations.

Both in this country and in

England, where she is a member of the Girl Guide association, Miss Tobitt has frequent contact with school-age children, of whose musical likes and capabilities she is keenly aware. Her training sessions for youth leaders are therefore based on practical experience. In them she includes instruction on presentation, leadership, the use of source material, the correlation of music with other activities, and the planning of music appreciation programs.

Collects Material

Miss Tobitt has collected much of her material in the picturesque villages of France, Italy, England, Scotland, and Wales. During her stay in this country she has added many American folk songs and dances, including Negro spirituals from the south and some of our rollicking mountain songs.

She has published many books of songs, folk dances, and dramatized ballads. All her material is well-known wherever Girl Scouts and young people get together.

For the past three years she has served with the Girl Scout Council of Greater New York, and for a time was a member of the national Girl Scout staff.
