Orides Mothers Announce Award Of Scholarships

Orides Mothers Club announces award of two one-term scholarships for spring term at the University of Oregon. Those receiving them are Miss Marie Hammerquist, who is majoring in education and expects to teach English and art, and Miss Marjorie Truchon, majoring in journalism and interested also in journal work. This makes a total of eight scholarships awarded by Orides Mothers.

Orides Mothers Club was organized in April 1940, about six years after the active chapter of Orides was instituted on the University of Oregon Campus, through its founder, the late Miss Janet Smith.

Miss Smith and the late Dean Hazel P. Schvering, as well as Mrs. Edith Siefert and Mrs. Alice B. Macduff, assisted the Mothers Club, and Mrs. Siefert was its advisor until recently. A revolving fund was established by advice of Miss Smith, into which each mother paid a dollar a year. This was used by Miss Smith to loan small amounts to girls who had temporary financial needs. About 1944, the club began working to build its scholarship fund, which was named "The Janet Smith Scholarship Fund," as a memorial to Miss Smith. This is used for Orides senior girls who are both worthy and in need of assistance. It was established by gifts of a dollar or more from members and friends.

The committee administering the fund is comprised of Mrs. Otto Alford, president of the club, Mrs. C. A. Rickabaugh, Mrs. Frank Rhodes and Mrs. J. Alan Wickham. Dean Wickham is credited with being extremely helpful to the group in the years she has been in office.
