Valley Irrigation Meet Slated

The Willamette Basin Irrigation conference is scheduled for Wednesday in Room 105, Memorial Union Building, on the campus of Oregon State College.

Fred Knox, chairman of the county Willamette Basin project committee, requests all those seeking transportation to the meeting to contact him at the public market or call the Chamber of Commerce.

Knox explained that the morning session will be devoted to a discussion of Willamette Valley Irrigation possibilities; Willamette Basin project in relation to fish life; and a talk on irrigated pastures.

Following lunch, the group will hear talks on the cost of irrigating vegetables in the valley; irrigation of vegetable crops for processing; irrigation research in the valley; fertilizers and irrigation; and irrigation equipment. There will be an irrigation equipment display in the armory.

Dinner will be served in the dining room of the Corvallis Hotel at 6:30 p.m. Governor Douglas McKay will address the diners on "Willamette Valley Project," and Ronald Jones, chairman of the Willamette Basin Commission, will speak on the program of the commission and committees.
