

Nine Arraigned In Circuit Court

Nine men were arraigned before Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court Wednesday morning. Sheriff C. A. Swarts said this was the greatest number of arraignments at one time in the 16 years he has been sheriff.

Arraigned on charges of burglary not in a dwelling were Oliver C. Phinney, Jr., 19, Sutherland; Gerald Elmo Steele, 20, Westfir; Lynn R. Simpson, 22, Williamette City; Elize Claud Farrell, 23, 604 South 10th St., Cottage Grove, and William Mack Damon, 409 Elm St., Springfield.

Facing forgery charges are Arthur E. Smith, 43, Southern Pacific Yards, Eugene and William E. Bowler, 43, Saginaw.

Charged with obtaining money under false pretenses are William Patterson West 54, Coburg and Harry L. Meyer, 44, Ontario.

All nine were arraigned on information filed by Dist. Atty. Ed Luckey after they had waived their rights to a grand jury hearing.

Phinney, Steele and Simpson were arrested only last Monday by state police and a sheriff's deputy who said they cleared several burglaries in the Westfir-Oakridge area after the arrests.

Farrell was involved with J. B. Castleman, 32, of Cottage Grove in two burglaries in the Cottage Grove area including the Community Jewelers.

Luckey said Wednesday that he believed Castleman would be returned to New Mexico authorities where he is a parole violator.

Rent Legislation Gets Green Light

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Chairman Burnet R. Maybank of the Senate Banking Committee Wednesday gave a subcommittee the signal for full speed ahead on legislation to extend rent controls.

Sen. John J. Sparkman (D-Ala.) said there was a slight chance the subcommittee might finish its rough draft late Wednesday.

Maybank told a reporter he thought the full banking committee could finish action on the bill this week and have it on the Senate calendar for consideration by Monday.

Sparkman predicted that his subcommittee will approve a stronger rent bill than the 15-month extension voted by the House Tuesday.

She Knows Too Much, So She Can Stay Here

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Congress has passed a bill to let a Chinese woman scientist stay in this country, after being told she knows too much to go back to her Communist-overrun land.

The measure, which is now up to the White House, would grant permanent residence to Dr. Chung

Kwai-lui, who first came to the United States in 1936, and has been here since under extensions of her original student's visa.

A graduate of the University of Oregon, she has been employed as a scientist by the Westinghouse Electric Corp., where, the House Judiciary Committee said, "she is doing confidential and secret work for the Army and Navy."

The committee reported that a Westinghouse official said she had information "which might be dangerous to the United States should she be forced to divulge it in an unfriendly country, and that he feels that due to the civil war in China it would be unwise to compel her to return to that country, at this time."

Dr. Chung, 48, and unmarried, was described as "an exceptional scientist." During the war he worked on the atomic bomb project, among other things.

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Rent Control Provisions Told

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Summary of major provisions of the rent control bill passed by the House late Tuesday:

1. Controls are extended 15 months beyond the present expiration date of March 31.

2. Any local governing body—state legislature, or county or city governing unit—can take its area out from under federal controls by passing a resolution to this effect and notifying Housing Expediter Tighe E. Woods.

3. In making hardship adjustments for landlords, local rent advisory boards are required "as far as practicable" to keep rents at a level that will give property owners "a reasonable return on a reasonable value" of their property.

4. Areas decontrolled by Woods since June 30, 1947, may be re-controlled. Areas decontrolled by court order remain so.

5. The housing expediter has complete control over evictions. He may bring suit in court for treble damages on behalf of tenants who are overcharged. He is authorized to appoint a housing officer for each rental area to help assure fair adjustments for both landlords and tenants.

6. Local rent advisory boards are continued. But if Woods vetoes a board recommendation, appeal may be taken to the emergency court of appeals only through a complaint filed by the board. Now such appeal is automatic.

7. Veterans' 30-day preference on rentals, sales and re-sales is continued.

8. Trailer sites where residents live permanently are re-controlled.

9. Conversions are no longer automatically decontrolled as in the present law. They remain under ceilings until Woods finds the conversion actually resulted in additional units.

10. The provision in the present law allowing for 15 per cent rent increases through voluntary landlord-tenant agreements would be repealed.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas Wednesday admitted administration forces have been licked in their anti-filibuster fight but he promised a series of record votes "to show who surrendered."

Lucas and other administration supporters were beaten by a bipartisan group which seized control of the Senate and ended a

fight backed by President Truman for a drastic anti-filibuster rule. The fight was started to prevent a Southern filibuster against Mr. Truman's civil rights program. It now appears that instead of being liberalized to make debate limitation earlier, the Senate rules will be tightened to make cloture more difficult.

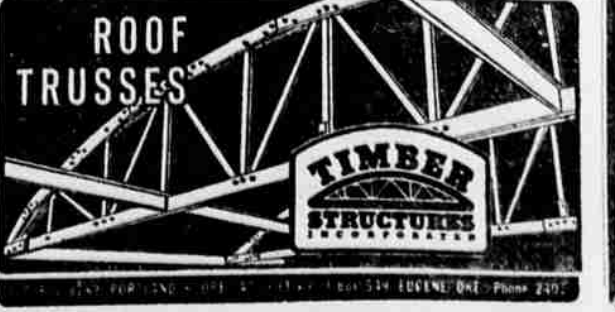
