Kentucky Glad It's Over — Had Been Waiting for Crown

SEATTLE, Wash., March 28 — (P) — Thirty-six points just aren't enough to beat the Kentucky Wildcats any more, the Oklahoma Aggies ruefully admitted Monday.

Time was back in the 1947 Sugar Bowl — when you could tally 36 points yourself, tie the Wildcats in knots and walk off with a 36 to 30 triumph. That's what the Aggies did the last time they played Kentucky.

Coach Hank Iba, who taught his Aggies to become the country's best defensive unit, had hoped his Bob Harris could put the clamps on Alex Groza, Kentucky's six-foot, seven-inch scoring machine.

Harris couldn't manage the job and fouled out after only four minutes of the second half. That was the "tell" on the game and Groza went on to score 25 points — giving him an NCAA record of 82 in three games, busting the

Iba Said Coach Of Year By NY Hoop Writers

NEW YORK, March 28 — (P) — Henry Payne "Hank" Iba, the Oklahoma Aggies' slow burn and deep freeze man, came up with a consolation prize Monday after losing the NCAA crown to Kentucky as he was named basketball's "coach of the year."

Voted by the Metropolitan Basketball Writers, it is, however, strictly a two-district honor — likely to be recognized only in New York and Oklahoma.

Henry Payne, who ordinarily is just that to the followers of fast, firehouse basketball, had a right good season. He lost only five games as his players, all specialists in his "control" basketball, mesmerized the opposition to win with scores reminiscent of a Philadelphia-Cincinnati baseball game.

The law of averages caught up to his pokey Cowpokes Saturday night in the NCAA finals at Seattle. This time they got the 36 points. Kentucky got the 46 and the championship.

So in most districts they are going to look on Iba's New York honors as a sort of galloping poll. Somewhat along the order of how four New York teams were able to get into the recent Invitation tournament — and out of it in the very first round.

The New York "coach of the year" balloting gave Iba the title with 77 points based on a 5-3-1 basis for first, second and third place votes. But in the matter of first place nominations, Hank received only seven compared with 12 for Young Pete Newell of San Francisco.

In the New York poll, he wound up only three points back of Iba. But the real sensation of the city slicker selections was the fact that Adolph Rupp, the round gent who directs the destinies of Kentucky's NCAA champions and conqueror of Iba's club, was a poor third with only 22 points. Old Rupp and ready received only three first place votes.

Finishing down the line were: Harry Combes, Illinois, nine points; Harold Anderson, Bowling Green, six; Cliff Welles, Tulane, five; Howard Hobson, Yale, four; Forrest Anderson, Bradley, and Tom Haggerty, Loyola of Chicago, each three; Henry Good, Nebraska, two, and Ken Norton, Manhattan, and Ed Hickey, St. Louis, each one.

Coast-League Pennant Race Begins Wed.

Pacific Coast League teams Monday settled down to a two-day wait for the pennant race curtain raisers Wednesday.

The league's fight clubs finished their exhibition game schedules Sunday and managers now have a two day pause in activity to make up their minds on starting lineups and squad cuts.

Manager Lou Boudreau's World Champion Cleveland Indians showed bay region fans the stuff of which champions are made Sunday. The Indians trimmed Oakland 1 to 0 in a morning game played before 10,685 fans and then beat San Francisco 4 to 2 in the afternoon as an all-time record crowd of 22,852 watched in Seals' Stadium.

Fine Pitching

The brilliant pitching staff of the Indians gave up only 12 hits in the two games. Outfielder Dale Mitchell's third inning homer was the winning blow in the morning struggle, while Bob Feller and Satchel Paige came through with a couple of mid-season pitching jobs in the nightcap against the Seals. Feller held San Francisco to five hits in five frames and the aged Negro star gave up but two hits in four frames. Cleveland got its winning runs in the eighth inning on Larry Doby's single and doubles by Joe Gordon and Ken Keltner.

Con Dempsey went the distance for San Francisco, giving up 10 hits.

In San Diego, the San Diego Padres had more success against major league opposition. The Padres trimmed the Chicago White Sox 5 to 2 for their second straight win over the Sox. San Diego got four runs off Bill Wright in the fourth inning on a single, double, two walks, an error and a wild pitch.

Two major league "B" teams got more of that same treatment. The Hollywood Stars edged the St. Louis Browns reserves 9 to 8 in Hollywood and Portland beat Pittsburgh's "B" squad 5 to 2 at Riverside.

The Stars needed to come from behind twice to win. A two run rally in the eighth frame, highlighted by Frankie Kelleher's homer, gave the Stars the victory. Portland got four runs in the opening inning on two home runs to coast to their triumph. Harvey Storey hit the first Portland four bagger with two men aboard and Leo Thomas followed him with another round tripper. Ted Beard homered for the losers.

Rainiers Beaten

Los Angeles took advantage of early inning wildness by Pitcher Guy Fletcher to defeat the Seattle Rainiers 8 to 2 at Fullerton. The Angels counted all their runs in the first three innings and then waited to the win as Charlie "Red" Adams limited Seattle to eight scattered hits. Cece Garriott homered in the third with two on for Los Angeles.

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Seattle Chucker Had Plenty of Experiences in Venezuela Loop

WILMINGTON, Calif., March 28 — (P) — Southpaw Clem Dreisevler arrived at the Seattle Rainiers' Coast League training camp to announce that he doesn't mind being the target for an occasional line drive, but gunfire—that's for birds.

"The big left-hander said he and his wife left the Venezuela League in a hurry last winter when a revolution broke out and bullets began to fly.

"We still played baseball that month of revolution," he said, "government agents were stationed at the entrance of the Caracas Park and they searched players and fans when they entered for knives and guns."

A few fist-fights and free-for-all broke loose during the ball games, the pitcher said, but nothing serious developed.

When the firing began in earnest, however, Dreisevler and the missus figured they had enough and they caught the first available plane back to the States. He said 13 bullets whistled through walls and windows one night into the room in which they were staying. They hid under the beds.

MINNESOTA BOOKED

SEATTLE, March 28 — (P) — Booking of the University of Minnesota for a pre-conference basketball series here Dec. 20-21 was announced Sunday by University of Washington Athletics Director Harvey Cassill.

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Most of the coaches told the NCAA rules and research committees they were fed up with the battle royals waged during the dying minutes of games. They left more than a dozen suggestions on rules changes affecting the final 120 seconds.

The consensus was that something should be done to prevent a winning team from "freezing" the ball, forcing the opposition to resort to rough stuff in attempting to regain possession during the waning minutes.

One of the foremost suggestions was the substitution of the word "must" for "may" in the present rule saying an official may call for a jump ball when a closely-guarded player is withholding the ball from play. The coaches agreed the change would take the burden of decision from the referee's shoulders.

Dodgers Break Camp
