

Willing Woman Has Attained Peace of Mind

OKLAHOMA CITY—(AP)—Mrs. Heart — another chapter in the life of... you'll be glad to know... feeling better — physically better and mentally better.

— most important — Mrs. Heart thinks maybe her other doctors were wrong after all.

"I'm not as excited now as I was," this woman identified only as Mrs. Heart says. "And I do feel better, much better."

You remember her, of course. She's the middle-aged retired Oklahoma City businesswoman—widow and moderately wealthy—who asked you for an assist in answering this question which was too big for her:

Doctors have told me I'll die from a heart ailment in a year. I have \$10,000 to spend in the next 12 months. How can I get the most enjoyment out of the money I've set aside?

Well, that was three months ago. Lots has happened to her since then. These paragraphs will bring you up to date.

To begin with, Mrs. Heart went away from here. Not permanently, you understand. She just had to get away from all the excitement her request provoked.

Advice Selfish

Because it brought answers—25,000 of them—from over the world after it was published in newspapers in several countries. Some of the advice was sincere. But mostly it was selfish.

They did, though, have their effect on this woman who says she never learned how to enjoy her money. She decided to see some more doctors. She didn't know if it would help her. She was willing to give it a try.

"I'm under medical care again," Mrs. Heart says. "But I can't say what they tell me—not now. But I will say this—maybe my other doctors were wrong about me just having a year to live."

Well, she returned here only last week. Some personal business, she says, brought her back for several weeks. Then she'll return to her out-of-state retreat.

Woman Incognito

"None of my friends have guessed my identity," she says. "Neither has my daughter."

The daughter lives in California. She and several charities—have been provided for in Mrs. Heart's will. The \$10,000, you'll remember, was what she allotted herself for the year that's supposed to be her last.

Mrs. Heart, who first said hers was "a reckless kind of feeling," doesn't mention the three months that already have passed.

"Mine is a peaceful feeling now," she says, "and feeling peaceful is a wonderful feeling."

"Perhaps peace is what I wanted—what I needed—after all."

"And I have found it..."

Columnist Dies In His Sleep

SAN DIEGO, Cal.—(AP)—Forrest Warren met death unafraid, as he said six weeks ago he would.

The 72-year-old newspaperman, columnist for the San Diego Daily Journal, "just went to sleep" at 5 a.m. Monday at his home.

Knowing he was dying of cancer, Warren told his readers about his approaching death in his column of May 17. He used the column as an appeal for the cancer fund research program. The Journal said the appeal had brought in \$35,000 to date.

Boggie's Funeral Set; Friend to Officiate

LEBANON—(AP)—One of the men who helped free Clarence Boggie from prison will be asked to officiate at Boggie's funeral Thursday.

He is the Rev. Ivan Ornell, Oregon, Wash., who was instrumental in efforts to clear Boggie of a Washington State murder conviction. Boggie was pardoned last Christmas Eve, after serving 13 years. He died of a heart ailment in a northern California logging camp last week, after six months of freedom.

The services will be held at 3 p.m. in the Howe-Huston Funeral Home here.
